Big Business on National Forests

That over one million dollars were received from the National forests of Oregon and Washington during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1925, is shown by a statement just issued by the U. S. Forest Service. These recelpts accured from the sales of Goverment timber, grazing fees, special use permits and other miscellaneous

Under existing laws, 25 percent of all National Forest receipts are returned to the States in which they accrue, for the road and school fund. An additional ten percent is made avallable for use by the Forest Service for road and trail work. This in an interesting contrast with some of the European countries having crown or national forests. In Sweden for instance it is said only 3 and 3-10% of the Crown forest receipts are returned to the local communes.

According to the report, the total Forests in Oregon for the fiscal year annuments 1925, amount to \$675,114.12. This would make a total of \$168,778.53 due to the State under the 25 percent fund. and \$67,511.41 to be available under the 10 percent fund.
