It is Mr. Loosley's intention to tear down the old building and erect a fine modern five-room bungalow for his personal use. Mr. Powell and G. M. Grainger have the contract to build the bungalow, and will commence at once to remove the old building.

Irrigated Orchards Are Only Producers

GRANTS PASS.—With a ready demand for Bartlett pears this year, ranging in price from \$60 per ton for canning pears to \$1.60 per box for the better grade Rogue river ranchers are enjoying one of the best harvests for several years. De Anju pears will probably bring from \$2.50 to \$3 per box.

Among other shippers who are sending fruit from the valley is Douglas Wood, who shipped 3500 boxes of canning Bartletts to Salem, netting the growers \$60 per ton. During the Bartlett season he has shipped about 10,000 boxes of pears, most of the consignment going east.

Mr. Wood is now shipping out Winter Banana apples. He will send three cars of this delicious fruit to Dennis, Kimball & Polk, at New York, and later will ship to this firm about 20,000 boxes of winter apples. Newtown pippins will sell for about \$2 a box this year.

Owing to the prolonged drought, Mr. Wood says apples and pears did not mature this year except where irrigated.

PUMPING IRRIGATION

The cost of pumping one foot of water over each square foot of a ten acre tract runs about \$5.80, says a new O. A. C. bulletin on the small irrigation pumping plant. But this cost applies only to fields one foot above the water level. The whole cost of covering the ten-acre tract one foot deep is as many times \$5.80 as the surface of the field is feet above the surface of the water supply. But the bulletin will make the matter plain to any citizen of Oregon who wants it, free.

ADOPTS CONSTITUTION

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 5.—The American Legion held a short business meeting Tuesday night at the Chamber of Commerce and adopted a constitution and by-laws. Another meeting will be held next Tuesday night.

LEASING BILL PASSES
