SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—A cache of aigrettes valued at \$25,000 was found aboard the steamship San Antonio, according to customs officials, who said the prohibited feathers were found in a pile of asbestos packing in the engine-room. There were 245 feathers, the officials said.

CULL APPLES IN DEMAND

HOOD RIVER, Ore.—Cull apples have never been in such demand as this season. Vinegar plants are already offering growers \$10 per ton for straight cider and vinegar stock after cookers have been removed, whereas the highest price past seasons has been \$8.

Canneries and dehydrating concerns are soliciting mixed cookers and cider apples, offering \$20 per ton. The Hood River Valley Products company, Henry Weinhard company, Libby, McNeil & Libby, and the King-Wittenberg company have established purchasing departments.
