

Boy Scouts to Aid the Soldiers

The Boy Scouts of America have been asked by the government to aid the war and navy departments in securing employment for returned service men. A canvas will be made in every city and town in the United States to enroll employers who declare their willingness to re-employ home-coming soldiers and sailors. Each troop has been furnished with a sample of the citation which Colonel Arthur Woods, assistant secretary of war, issues on behalf of the government to every patriotic employer who has taken back or will take back those who left him to enlist. The troops are pledged to secure at least one application for the citation from some employer for each scout in their membership. The Boy Scouts of Ashland will make this canvass among employers in this city, who are asked to receive the boys kindly when they call.
