CHAMPION WALKER IN ASHLAND TODAY

Ashland was visited today by Henry Stewart of San Diego, Calif., who claims to be the champion walker of the world. Mr. Stewart, who is an elderly man, states that he has walked 60,000 miles over four continents since 1910, and has seen many adventures. His latest trip started in February from Washington, D. C., and consisted of a journey over the Cumberland mountains to Pittsburgh, Pa. From there his route took him to Chicago and St. Paul, and as he had not seen Winnipeg, Canada, for 32 years, he took a side trip there to see how that country had improved. While in Canada he stopped long enough to pitch some bundles in the harvest fields. The aged man is covered with medals which he has picked up from practically every civilized country in the world. He is now on his way to his home where he expects to recount his experiences in a book of travels.
