# Pan-American Money Congress to Be Held

(By the United Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—The second Pan-American financial conference will meet in Washington, January 12 to work out better and broader trade arrangements with Latin America.

The first financial congress met in 1915 but further meetings were postponed because of the war.

This conference will not deal with loans from one government to another but will try to establish a favorable basis for the coming together of financiers.

Pursuant to this aim the financial requirements of the Latin American republics now and during the next few years will constitute the chief subject for discussion.

Means of permitting closer commercial relations through removal of administrative and fiscal obstacles and the problem of better transportation and communication facilities will come up for discussion.

The future financial requirements of the American republics are very extensive. In view of the enormous demands now being made for credit facilities in the United States from Europe and other quarters of the world, it is impossible for the republics of Latin America to find all their requirements readily and economically met in the markets of the United States. With the joint application of the French and British governments selling in United States markets at a rate equivalent to a 7 1/2 per cent yield to the investor, the less rich and newer nations such as will be represented in the conference cannot obtain more reasonable terms than the old countries.

Several Latin American governments are seeking loans in the markets of the United States, while a great number of their public utility enterprise and major private undertakings are actively soliciting financial support, either for the purpose of legitimate expansion or for much needed rehabilitation after four years' deprivation of necessary supplies.

The problem of improved banking facilities for the representatives of the United States in Latin America also will come up for detailed discussion. At the present one bank has, either directly or through affiliated institutions, more than twenty branches in Latin America, while another is in control of at least six local financial institutions in Latin America.

Other banks are opening branches or securing financial interest in existing institutions or establishing agencies suitable for the work which they carry on. An extension of United States facilities through a greater use of acceptances and other less widely known means of expanding credit without upsetting the equilibrium of exchange, will naturally come in for discussion.

The present exchange situation in Latin America, which requires careful examination, will be one of the topics of primary importance at the conference. Agreements, whether unofficial as between banks, or official

as between governments in the form of guaranty of international clearing operations, will be studied and formulated or sanctioned by the conference before its adjournment. The hope is entertained that the conclusion of the International Gold Clearance convention between the United States and a number of other republics, will be brought to an advanced stage before the close of the conference. Exchange conditions have been improving rapidly during the past year, and it is not thought that much time would elapse before they will be entirely restored to normal, to the benefit of all concerned.

And he does it so easily. Kanatsher awakens each morning like an ordinary individual and an hour later the phone rings.

In another hour Kanatsher, at the head of some 300 of Uncle Sam's soldiers is releasing the kidnapped heroine and has Villa doing a shimmy dance for his pleasure.

Peccoliar chap this Kanatsher? Not at all. He's just the man in charge of the moving picture department of the Soldiers' and Sailors' employment bureau of Los Angeles—a quasi-municipal organization which handles the job of getting jobs for discharged service men.

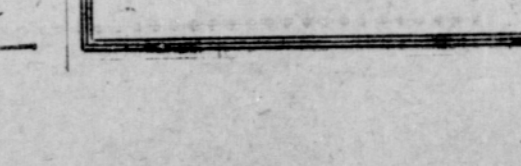
