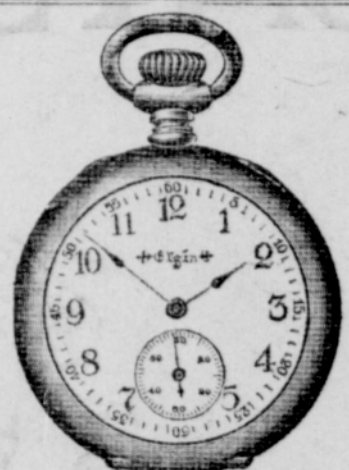

FUNERAL LODGE MEETING

Masons please meet at Masonic hall, Friday afternoon, Nov. 28, at 1:15 o'clock, for purpose of attending funeral services of the late Samuel H. Holt, a member of Ashland Lodge, No. 23, A. F. & A. M. F. F. JOHNSON, W. M. W. H. DAY, Secy.

HOLT FUNERAL HELD FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Funeral services over the remains of the late State Senator S. H. Holt, whose death occurred Tuesday, November 25, will be held Friday afternoon. A brief private service will be held at the house at 1:30, after which the body will be borne to the Presbyterian church at Phoenix where the funeral will take place at 2 o'clock, and interment will be made in the Phoenix cemetery. The Masonic order will have charge of a service at the grave.

Mr. Holt was born in Knox county, Tennessee, April 12, 1840. At the outbreak of the Civil War, being a strong advocate of the abolition of chattel slavery, he left his county and joined the Union army. He later located near Atwood, Platt county, Illinois, where he was united in marriage with Margaret A. Biggs December 20, 1869. He moved to Phoenix, Jackson county, Oregon, some 35 years ago and engaged in farming and later moved to Ashland and for several years has been engaged in developing and farming the Holt place on the Rogue River orchard tract.

Of seven children born to the family three survive—W. A. Holt, who holds a position in the internal revenue service at Portland, Mrs. California Sweeney of Winnemucca, Nev., and Mrs. California Dunn of Reno, Nev. Their mother died at Phoenix October 3, 1883. He was again united in marriage with Mrs. Mary E. Tichenor, January 26, 1904.

Mr. Holt was a man of fine character and good purposes, and his political and public career was unique in this respect that he was firm in his convictions and not easily moved by the prevailing popular opinion and methods when they were against sound policy as he viewed the matter. He was an extended student of political and economic issues and was among the band of opponents of the liquor traffic who stood up and were counted year in and year out when the cause was utterly hopeless. Along other lines he was one of the organizers of the Farmers' Alliance in Jackson county in the eighties, from which was born the people's party movement. When that cause became a factor in this state and was the controlling party in Jackson county he was elected to the state senate and served four years in that body. Mr. Holt was a progressive and during his entire career in Jackson county was not associated with either of the two established political parties. Though of a progressive mode of thought Mr. Holt was steady and patient and neither in language or manner had the appearance of an agitator who expected to see the world converted to his views in a laws of what now constitutes the minute.
