Mobley of Medford, Ore., a man who has had considerable experience in the study of the oil fields of California, commenced looking into conditions of the prospects for drilling for oil in Northern California, and especially in Siskiyou county. Mobley has recently closed contracts with the owners of land lying between Ager and Grenada for close to 30,000 acres.

The favorable structural conditions range through the valley for a width of an average of one and a half miles, lying chiefly on the western side of the Southern Pacific railroad.

Mobley had private capital ready to take over the above contracts and commence prospecting and drilling at an early date.

The coal mines that were opened a few years ago, lying a few miles south of Ager, will be reopened and further development done. These mines have always given very promising results, but on account of not sufficient capital they were allowed to go by default. Artesian water has been developed in many places between Ager and Montague, especially near the coal mines. The people of northern Siskiyou are looking forward to the prospect of having oil fields, artesian water and coal.
