CALIFORNIANS TRIED AGAIN

(By United Press) MARYSVILLE, Calif., March 29.—Frank A. McCormick today again goes on trial charged with the murder of Charles Brown, rich Yuba county sheep raiser.

A month ago the jury in his first trial was dismissed—deadlocked, with six for conviction and six for acquittal.

Brown's slaying on November 1 created a sensation in California. He was shot through the next by McCormick, and after he had fallen McCormick's sister, Mrs. Gertrude Wilson, pumped several more bullets into the prostrate form.

Mrs. Wilson, pretty wife of a newspaper man and the first woman ever to stand trial here for murder, was acquitted. Evidence showed she shot Brown after her life was extinct.

FLOOD WIPES OUT BARLEY

YUBA CITY, Calif.—Word received from the Ajax Dredging company, which is operating near Knights Landing, says the report that water is flowing over the weir at Tisdale is unfounded, as the Sacramento river has not yet reached a height sufficient to overflow. The report was current here that barley lands in district 1660 had been overflowed and great loss would result. However, the Sacramento is steadily rising and may go over inside the next 24 hours.

The Feather river has caused water to back up in the Nelson slough south of this city and is flowing into the bypass.

KLAMATH GETS NEW CHURCH

The church built 35 years ago was one of the oldest landmarks in Klamath county. I used to think that my grandmother was fussy. She would say: "My dear! No lady sits with her knees far apart."

"Oh, mercy! child, how are you sitting? Haven't I told you time and again that it is not lady-like to have your knees crossed? You may cross the feet if you wish, but not the knees."

"Sit up, sit up, girlie. You will get roundshouldered if you let your chest fall in and you, yourself, droop down in that listless manner. It is not good for your spine, either."

And I would protest and say that I could be a lady no matter how I sat or stood. Nevertheless, I knew in my heart that what grandmother meant by "lady-like" and "being a lady" was really "graceful" and "refined." Naturally, a graceful and refined girl would be a lady.
