# DISABLED SOLDIERS ARE EDUCATED

SEATTLE—According to information given out here today by Claude H. Anderson, head of the Federal Board for Vocational Education in this district, the following disabled soldier of Ashland are being taught occupations at the expense of the government. Others who are eligible have deferred their training for various reasons as classified below.

District No. 13, which includes Washington, Oregon, and Idaho, has trained or approved for training over 2000 disabled soldiers to date.

In Training—Oliver Anderson, mechanical engineering; Edmond M. Barrett, animal husbandry; Andrew B. Freeman, agriculture; all at Oregon Agricultural College.

Approved—Deferred account of illness—Fred J. Ritzinger, agriculture, at University of Idaho.

The government is training these men because they were disabled by wounds or diseases which handicap them in following their former occupations. Some are trained in schools, others in shops, factories or stores, some by a combination of both methods. Single men receive \$80 per month for living expenses. Additional amounts, bringing the total up to as high as \$150 per month, are allowed for dependents.

**Leases for Oil Rights in Klamath**

KLAMATH FALLS—Considerable interest and excitement is aroused in this vicinity as the result of offers that have been made to numerous ranchers for lease to the oil rights of their property, and the situation has attracted the aspect of a miniature boom, it is said by those conversant with operations. The attempts to lease property has not been confined to one particular locality but is general throughout the valley and has given rise to the report that five or six rigs are ready to start drilling as soon as the capitalists behind the project have closed sufficient leases.

South of the California line, Siskiyou county is having the same experience. Much property has been placed under lease there by oil prospectors. The Medford Oil company is sinking a well west of the Cascades and there is much discussion in technical terms by the Medford press regarding the progress and possibilities of drilling in that field, and considerable activity on the part of speculators seeking leases.

**ROSEBURG WILL VOTE ON MUNICIPAL PLANT**

ROSEBURG—According to an ordinance passed by the city council, voters of this city will pass upon the proposed bonding measure at the election May 1, providing a municipal light and water system.

The bonds would be for a 20-year period, bear interest at 5 per cent and be payable at any interest-bearing period after 10 years. The ordinance would establish a sinking fund from the net profit to retire the bonds. The measure provides that a tax be levied in addition to other taxes to pay the interest and establish a sinking fund.

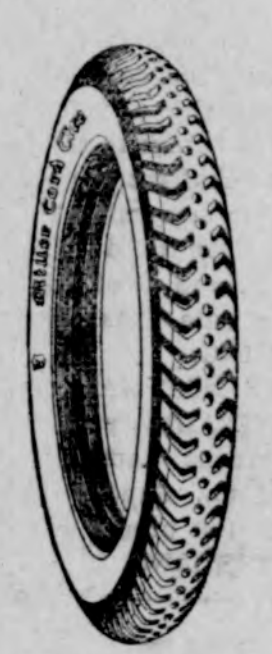
