TESTS AIRPLANE WOOD FOR DECAY

Now that the accidental breakage of airplanes is less than in the strenuous days of the war, the attention of the Forest Products Laboratory, maintained by the United States Department of Agriculture at Madison, Wis., has been called to instances in which airplane parts have had to be replaced because of decay. The fact is being recognized that many woods in common use for making aircraft are not sufficiently resistant. Fortunately, there are highly resistant woods whose value in aircraft has been demonstrated. One of these is Port Orford cedar. Others which tests in the laboratory have shown to be very resistant to decay are southern cypress and California redwood. Douglas fir, white oak and black walnut also stand fairly high in durability. Spruce, which has been a favorite wood for aircraft, is appreciably less durable than the other species mentioned here. Likewise, basswood, beech, birch, and maple may be classed with less durable species.
