Boom to Get Coast Logs

PORTLAND—Logs from many coast sections of the state are to go over the great log booming plant being completed on the Willamette slough. Terminals and dumps, the largest on any rivers of the Northwest, are being installed at a cost of \$250,000. The first timber to go through is that being cut in the virgin country on the Nehalem-Tualatin watershed.

TAPS FIR FOR TURPENTINE

PORTLAND—Much after the fashion of collecting maple sap, the Northwestern Turpentine company has been gathering pitch from fir stands in this section and has begun production of turpentine and rosin. Leases have been secured on certain tracts of timber, providing that all holes bored in trees shall be plugged up when the pitch has been removed. After securing the turpentine by distilling, it has been found that a small amount of balsam could be obtained from old growth yellow fir.

TAP SUGAR SACK SOFTLY BY USING SUBSTITUTES

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis.—"Conserve sugar by using honey, syrup and dried fruits—prunes, raisins, figs, dates, pears and peaches," say food specialists at the Oregon Agricultural college.

Products cooked with strained honey are said to have a pleasing characteristic honey flavor. One cup of honey may replace one cup of sugar, but the milk or other liquid should be reduced one-fifth cup for each cup of honey.

Spices give their most agreeable flavor when used with honey in all flour mixtures.

Cooking fruits with the cereals will sweeten the cereal and save sugar. Raisins with cream of wheat, figs with wheatina, or farina, are examples of good combinations.

Corn syrup may be used in stewing or baking fruit, using one-half cup of syrup to each pound of fruit. Dried fruits are stewed 10 minutes, after soaking overnight in water.

A few raisins in the rhubarb sauce add flavor as well as help out the sweetening.

Cereals may be served sweetened with syrup or with sweet fruits.

WANTS ROOSTER TO SUPPLANT DONKEY

CHICAGO.—The rooster should supplant the donkey as the Democratic party's emblem, according to Mrs. Frederick Tahl, chairman of the finance committee of the Illinois democratic women's

committee. She says that millions of little silver roosters will be taken to the national convention at San Francisco by democratic women. She said: "The rooster is a proud bird and has something to crow about. I find the donkey was wished on the party just after the Civil War when the democrats stubbornly refused the reconstruction program of the opposite party. The democrats are not 'mullish,' only 'firm.'"

SALEM PLANT PREPARES DEHYDRATED FRUITS

SALEM.—Spinach to tempt the palate of the Upper Mississippi valley dweller is to-be the first of the spring run to go out of the King's Products plant here. The company is preparing to handle \$2,000,000 worth of dehydrated fruits and vegetables this season. The company is reorganizing and is being financed by local people. If sufficient stock is sold construction will begin on a new cold storage plant badly needed here.

MARTENS RECALLED BY RUSSIAN SOVIET

WASHINGTON.—Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, who for more than 15 months has been in the United States as the self-styled Russian soviet ambassador, has been recalled by the soviet authorities, it was learned in official circles.

Martens' confidential secretary, Santoro Nuorteva, left the United States several weeks ago by way of Canada, and now is believed to be attending the conference being held in England by Gregory Krassin, bolshevik minister of commerce, it was said tonight by department of justice officials.
