MRS. CORDELL LAID PLANS READY FOR TO REST SATURDAY SUMMER SCHOOL

The funeral services of Mrs. Nannie L. Cordell were held in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Victor Mills, Saturday, June 26, conducted by Rev. C. P. Koehler, pastor of the local Presbyterian church. The remains were buried in the Ashland cemetery. Mrs. Cordell was born November 18, 1863, on a farm near Harrodsburg, Ky. This farm proved a quiet retreat during the war and here her childhood and youth were spent in quiet contentment and unalloyed happiness. Her earlier married life also was most happy. Later the malady took possession of her which proved incurable and resulted in untold suffering up to the time of her death.

Though handicapped seriously in this manner she yet served her generation well. She had the happy faculty of remembering in her ministrations such as are generally overlooked, and she sought to

make happy all with whom she came into contact. She stored her mind with the choicest gems of literature and consequently her conversation was rich with wholesome ideas.

Though not long a resident of Ashland, she yet made many friends here many of whom were present at the funeral services to show their appreciation of her worth.

A very interesting feature of the occasion was the reading of a poem composed by Mrs. Cordell entitled "Mothers' Day," which was written to a friend who had lost a mother and in commemoration of the first Mothers' Day.

Under the direction of Professor Leland A.
