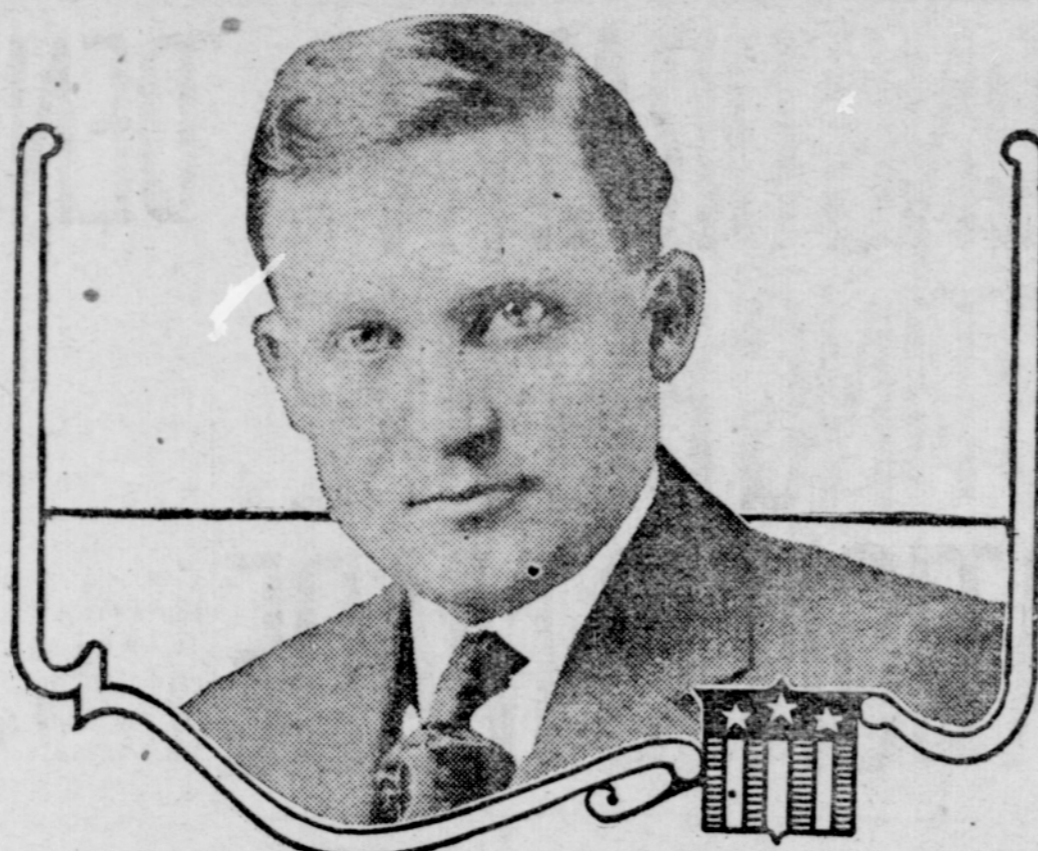

E. B. Fish Comes Out of Labor Ranks to Fight Radicals and Bolshevists



One of the outstanding events of Chautauqua this year will be the lecture appearance of E. B. Fish of Everett, Wash. This young apostle of 100 per cent Americanism came right out of the labor ranks at the time of the Seattle general strike and started a speaking campaign for sane thinking. He was a mechanic in the Everett shipyards, and in a month he had challenged the attention of the entire Northwest by his two-listed fighting methods and his unusual speaking abilities. For a year he has been talking to laboring men, in the mills, in the lumber camps, on the waterfront. Now he appears on the Chautauqua platform for the first time. If you have red American blood in your veins you will want to hear him.

Siskiyou Co. Has Shortage Of Teachers

YREKA.—That Siskiyou county may face a famine of teachers during the coming term is the fear expressed by the county board of education, according to Mrs. Kate E. Horn, secretary of that body. Teachers already enrolled number 58, while the districts total 94. In some of these six or seven teachers are employed, though in the majority but one is needed, but so far there are not enough instructors to place one in each school.

Other counties in the state have already expressed their fear that they will see a shortage of teachers this year and probably until salaries of instructors are in-
creased throughout the state.

of dynamite. A high power percussion cap was arranged so that any impact would detonate the explosive. Postal officials said, after an examination of the device, that the charge was sufficient to demolish the local post-office.
A postoffice clerk in stamping the letter with a metal stamp missed the percussion cap by a fraction of an inch. Experts on explosives assert that it is a mystery why the letter was not exploded during the handling and distribution of the mails.

WEIGHT OF LOADS MUST BE LIMITED

At the July 1 meeting of the county court at Jacksonville an order was made fixing the maximum capacity load of any vehicle passing over any paved highway within Jackson county, exclusive of the weight of the vehicle, at 10,000 pounds, and that no loads shall pass over the paved highways wherein the weight on any wheel shall exceed 600 pounds to the inch of tire on any vehicle.

ASKS CITIZENSHIP ON BOYHOOD MEMORIES

NEW YORK.—A claim of American citizenship, based on boyhood recollections of the Bowery in 1864 and scenes at the Chicago fire in 1871, was submitted to Ellis Island immigration officials in support of a request for a stay of deportation for MacGregor Ross, 67, of Seattle, Wash., alleged radical agitator.

He arrived at Ellis Island and was ordered deported in February, 1919. But he was released in March and returned home. Last November in Port Angeles, Wash., he was arrested again on charges of criminal syndicalism and sabotage and held in \$20,000 bail.

Immigration officials investigated the case and, his attorney says, "judged by his name that Scotland must be his home land" and ordered him deported to that country. Ross, so far as he knows was never in Scotland.

FRENCH HONOR AWARDED TO MRS. ROOSEVELT, JR.

NEW YORK.—Twenty-four secretaries of the Young Men's Christian association have been accorded the degree of officer de l'Academie by France for services

during the war and after the signing of the armistice, it has been announced by the overseas department of the Y. M. C. A. here. The decoration is awarded in recognition of services performed by the "Y" secretaries for both the French and American armies.
Among those receiving this degree are Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt Jr., of Oyster Bay, L. I.
