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## RESOLUTE WINS IN THIRD RACE

### DEFENDER LEAVES SHAMROCK BEHIND

 ABOARD DESTROYER GOLDSBOROUGH, July 21—The American defender Resolute won today in the yacht race over the challenger, Shamrock IV.

The Resolute set the pace the first half mile of the third race with the Shamrock for the America cup. The American boat reached the outer mark of the fifteen mile course with a commanding lead. Six miles from the finish she was 300 yards ahead.

With a wind which at times reached 14 knots, the race was the most interesting of the season. The Resolute went into the lead of the third battle with the Shamrock at the start. The Resolute gradually gained on her rival and as she turned the outer mark, led one minute, 45 seconds. The fifteen miles back to the starting point were nearly run before the wind.

Three miles from the finish the Resolute was leading by 250 yards and the wind held well.

ABOARD DESTROYER GOLDSBOROUGH, July 21—The postponement flag was hoisted today half an hour before the time to start the third race of the Shamrock and Resolute, for the America yachting championship. Lipton only needs to win one more race to capture the trophy and the excitement is intense. The race was under way at 1 p. m., the Shamrock crossing the line slightly ahead. The Resolute was 19 seconds behind.

A half hour after the start the Shamrock had the lead of at least an eighth of a mile, going rapidly. When the Shamrock split her tacks the Resolute went into the lead 100 yards. At 2:50 the Resolute was nearly a half mile in the lead.

After the Resolute took the lead the yachts were so close together a man could have jumped from one deck to another. The work of both boats was fast and smart seamanship was evident on both boats. An eight mile breeze made time for fast thinking and faster action.

### MURDERER TO HANG

### Livestock Output Shrinks Heavily

 WASHINGTON, July 21—Decrease of 400,000,000 pounds in the country's meat production for the last six months as compared with last year, was reported by the institute of American meat packers. Statistics of the agriculture department showing 2,500,000 fewer cattle, hogs and sheep were slaughtered at 69 markets during the last six months were used as the basis for the estimated decrease production.

"During nearly every month of 1920 producers lost money on cattle and many packers reported losses on beef," said the statement. "Prices of hogs and pork products are substantially lower than last year, due largely to diminished exports. The decrease in slaughter indicates that as a result of these losses, some producers have cut their herds and may restrict production. Such a situation would be an economic misfortune. Past experience has been normally that higher prices for meat animals, and hence for meat, have followed restricted production, after which the consumer again restricted consumption."

Cattle prices in May, the statement added, were "down near the level prevailing when the United States entered the war," but in June the average price in Chicago of \$14.95 for native beef steers "was, with exception of June, 1910, the highest June average on record." Fluctuations in receipts during the two months were said to have caused the changes.

### WILL TRY TO MEET RAISE

 WASHINGTON, July 21—Railroad executives met today with passenger and freight traffic manager to consider means of raising the \$600,000,000 wage increase of rail workers. Those attending said it is probable they will decide to ask the interstate commerce commission to raise passenger fares half a cent a mile.

### West For Harding, Is Assurance

 SAN FRANCISCO, July 21—The republican national committee men and state chairmen of six far western states today sent a telegram to Harding, assuring him he will carry these states in November.

### WOULD DEMAND DEB'S RELEASE

 DENVER, July 21—The proposal that the republican and democratic presidential nominees join him in his "demand" upon the president to release Eugene Debs immediately from the Atlanta prison was telegraphed from here by Parley P. Christensen, the farmer-labor nominee, to Cox and Harding. The message, sent overnight, was made public today.

### Unions In Conference

 CHICAGO, July 21—Definite acceptance or rejection of the railroad labor board of \$600,000 wage advance is expected today, as the two thousand representatives of the railway unions continue in conference.

### Calm Before The Storm

 MARION, July 21—Harding had a quiet day today preparatory to the ceremonies tomorrow of officially notifying him of his selection as the republican presidential candidate.  CLEVELAND, July 21—The Cleveland yardmen's association, composed of the yardmen, struck in sympathy with the "rebel element" in Chicago, today, going on record against accepting the award of the railway labor board.

### WILL NOT REOPEN HEARING

 CHICAGO, July 21—The United States rail board today rejected the request of the railroad union heads to reopen the hearing for wage demands.

The request for the rehearing was made by a committee of five union leaders, who appeared before the full labor board.

### THE COMMONER ASSAILS COX

 WASHINGTON, July 21—In the July issue of the Commoner, W. J. Bryan says:

"Cox's position has been that congress can permit an increase in the alcoholic content of beverage liquors and weaken the enforcement provision and his supporters say it should be done. The thing to do is to elect a senate and house that will not pass such a bill, and then remember that a congress dry by a 2-to-1 majority to enforce the law. There is very little that he can do if congress does its duty."

### ASKS IRISH INDEPENDENCE

 LONDON, July 21—A proposal for the virtual independence of Ireland, with provision against interference of any foreign government with Irish affairs is understood to be under consideration in the British cabinet today. The proposal includes the withdrawal of every vestige of British military and civil authority.

### WILL OPEN CAMPAIGN AUG. 15

 COLUMBUS, July 21—The democratic stump campaign will be opened in the middle west and east by Cox and in the far west by Roosevelt about August 15. Cox said this plan represented the consensus of the opinion of the democratic national committee and will be undoubtedly followed. The democratic presidential nominee said he expected to carry the campaign further west early in September.

### DRAFT EVADER SURRENDERS

 NEW YORK, July 21—Erwin Bergdoll, of Philadelphia, the alleged draft evader, whom federal authorities have sought for two and a half years, surrendered at Governor's Island today. He is a brother of Grover Bergdoll, a nationwide search for whom is now being made.

Bergdoll was ordered confined in Fort Jay, in which prison his brother was held some time prior to his escape from the armed guards, on leave at the home of his mother in Philadelphia.

### Hears Girl Scream From Automobile

 SAN FRANCISCO, July 21—While searching for his 12-year-old daughter, who vanished from home last night, Louis Spane was startled today by screams he recognized as those of his girl, from an automobile which sped past him. The car bore a license number owned by Mrs. Merritt of the Fairmont Hotel. She could not be reached. The police believe the machine was stolen by the kidnapers.

### ADDS INSULT TO INJURY.

### BATTLE TO SAVE PALMS

 RIVERSIDE, Calif., July 21—Reinforcements were sent today to relieve the fire fighters at Palm Canyon, where 350 or 400 are battling in relays to save the wonderful collection of native palms, the only ones in the United States. March aviation field is sending a squad to relieve those on the fire line for the past 24 hours.

### SUFFRAGISTS MAY APPEAL

BURLINGTON, Vt.—If the suffrage amendment is not soon ratified by the thirty-sixth state, Vermont suffragists will appeal to the United States supreme court to declare illegal Governor Clements' veto of the presidential suffrage bill passed by the Vermont legislature last year. This was announced in a statement from suffrage state headquarters.

### JAPANESE OWN PLACER CO.

 AUBURN, Calif., July 21—The Japanese have conquered Placer county, Assemblyman Parker today told the congressional committee investigating the Japanese situation. Of 20,000 acres of cultivated land in the county more than 17,000 are leased or owned by Japanese, Chinese or Hindus, Parker declared.

### DRY CONVENTION ATTACKS PARTIES

LINCOLN, Neb., July 21—Delegates to the prohibition party convention were called to order at 10:15 today by Chairman Hinshaw. About 300 are in attendance, with a scattering crowd on the floor and in the galleries.

Bryan sentiment is apparently waning. Rev. B. E. Prugh of Harrisburg, Pa., offered prayer. Prugh asked for the guidance of God over the party.

Marion S. Watkins, of Ohio, temporary chairman, made the keynote address.

### Advices Russian, Polish Armistice

LONDON, July 21—Premier Lloyd George in the House of Commons said the Polish premier had undertaken to withdraw the armies of Poland within their legitimate frontier in accordance with the British proposal for an armistice with the Soviet. The premier declared the Soviet reply to the peace proposal showed the Moscow government is prepared to consider the British proposal for an armistice in a friendly spirit and added indications are the Soviet will only consider a discussion with the Polish proletariat government, which Lloyd George characterized as "intolerable."

In order to test the Soviet's desire for peace the British premier declared, Great Britain advised Poland to seek an armistice by direct negotiations with Moscow. If the Russians refused and continued to advance, the allies will assist Poland.

Lloyd George declared within the last few days Poland had raised a new army of three hundred thousand volunteers. He said the British ambassador at Berlin had already gone to Poland and Marshal Foch will proceed to Warsaw later.

### Hour Added To Work Day

TOPEKA, Kan.—Men employed in the locomotive shops of the Santa Fe railroad here have gone on a nine-hour day, adding one hour to regular time.

This action was taken to increase the output of locomotives for moving the nation's grain crops.

### Reaches Grand Rapids
