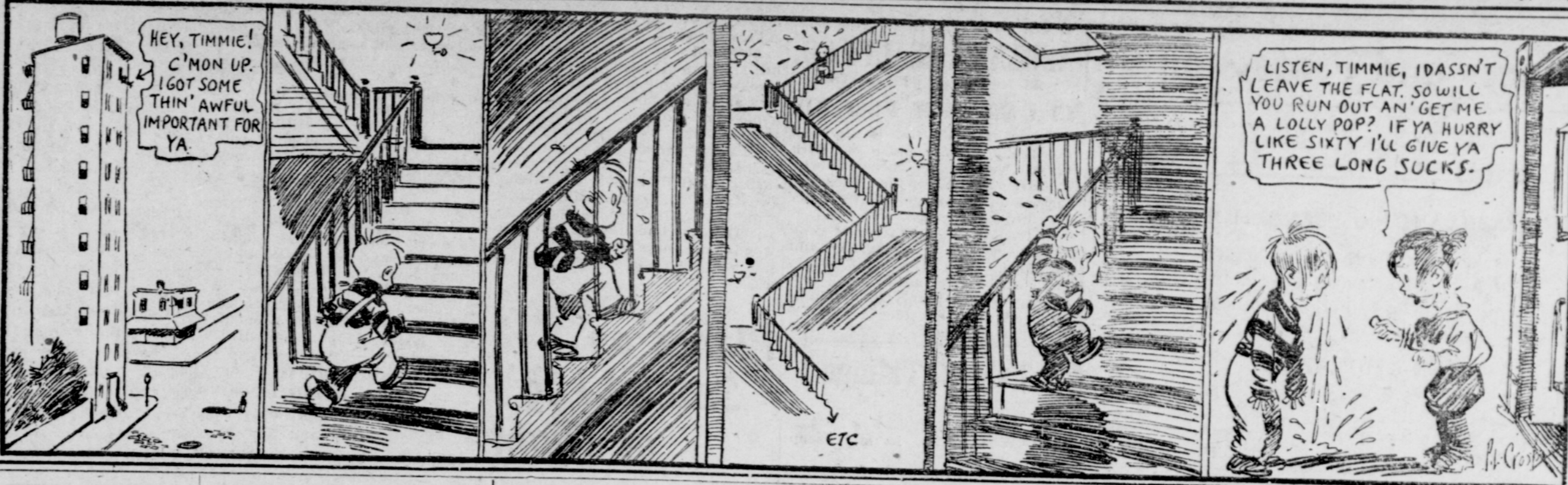

AUTO TRIP OVER WONDER HIGHWAY

The pathfinding trip for the longest auto scenic highway in the world, sponsored by the National Park service and promoted by the National Park-to-Park Highway association, is being made by A. L. Westgard, field representative of the American Automobile association.

The wonder highway, 4,500 miles in length, traverses nine states, including Oregon, Washington and California, and connects the principal national parks of the west. This boulevard, permanent improvement of which is to be asked of congress, will be officially opened by federal and state officials, including Stephen T. Mather, director general of national parks, and other, who will start from Denver, August 25. The tour will take about 60 days.

Mr. Westgard in his pathfinding trip, will visit the following towns: Portland, July 22; Salem, Albany and Eugene, July 23; Roseburg, July 24; Grants Pass, July 25; Medford, July 26; Crater Lake National Park, July 27, and Medford and Ashland, July 28.

Europe has for years held American pleasure seekers in a sort of wondrous awe of the inspiration that envelops the Alps. This park-to-park highway encircles a panoramic recreational area, linking mountain peaks with valleys and cities, rivalling in grandeur the scenic resorts of Europe. The national parks of the west, connected with a continuous highway, are destined to become the international playgrounds of the world.

CHILD WELFARE TALKS VALUABLE

State Superintendent of Child Welfare of Oregon for W. C. T. U. Mary L. Mallet of Portland, is giving valuable talks on child welfare each day at 4 o'clock. Mothers should not miss hearing her.

Ninety per cent of the births and deaths of this state are recorded. We as a nation are the most negligent of all nations, with the exception of Switzerland and Spain, in the care of mothers and babies. Of a population of 22,000,000, three-fourths have defects in health, 4,700,000 are suffering from malnutrition. We cannot break God's laws of health and expect to be healthy.

Dark circles under eyes indicate lack of nourishment. Constipation, rounded shoulders, flat and narrow chests. Causes of Malnutrition—"Diet is wrong." Poverty. Health teaching has been neglected.

Ignorance is another cause of malnutrition. Beef broth is not food, only a stimulant unless rice or vegetables are put in it. Lack of Parental Control—There is no reason why young mothers should not know how to raise children to be healthy. All mothers attend meeting in Chautauqua building at 4 p. m. Wednesday and Thursday.

Five Rivers Plans Roads

EUGENE, Ore.—Down in the Five Rivers country, which is perhaps the most inaccessible portion of Lane county, the people are planning to build good roads so that they may do their trading at Eugene, their county seat, instead of going out the other way toward Alsea and Corvallis, according to R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the Siuslaw national forest, who has just returned from a trip to that section. While at Fisher postoffice the supervisor found a large number of the ranchers of that district at a meeting called for the purpose of planning to build a highway that will connect them with the outside world. The settlers there hope to interest Lane county officials in the matter of providing a good road to Swishome, the nearest railroad point on the Coos Bay branch, so that they may then be able to reach Eugene from their homes in one day.

JURY CAN'T DECIDE STATUS OF GINGER

(By United Press) SEATTLE, Wash., July 21.—D. W. Larke and J. H. Parker secured their freedom because the jury which heard their case was unable to decide whether Jamaica ginger is a beverage or a medicine. Larke, who is a drug store proprietor, and Parker, his clerk, were charged with selling a large amount of the Jamaica ginger. The defense claimed ginger is a medicine and the sale of it was within the law.

Fire Blight Discovered

EUGENE, Ore.—Fire blight in malignant form has been discovered in two apple orchards near Thurston, ten miles east of Eugene, according to C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, who will take steps immediately to eradicate the disease. This is the first blight discovered in Lane county in two years. While the disease has not spread to any great extent in the Thurston orchards, it is of a malignant type. Two or three years ago the blight spread over a larger territory in the northern part of Lane county and in Benton county but by hard and persistent work the inspector was able after a long time to eradicate it.

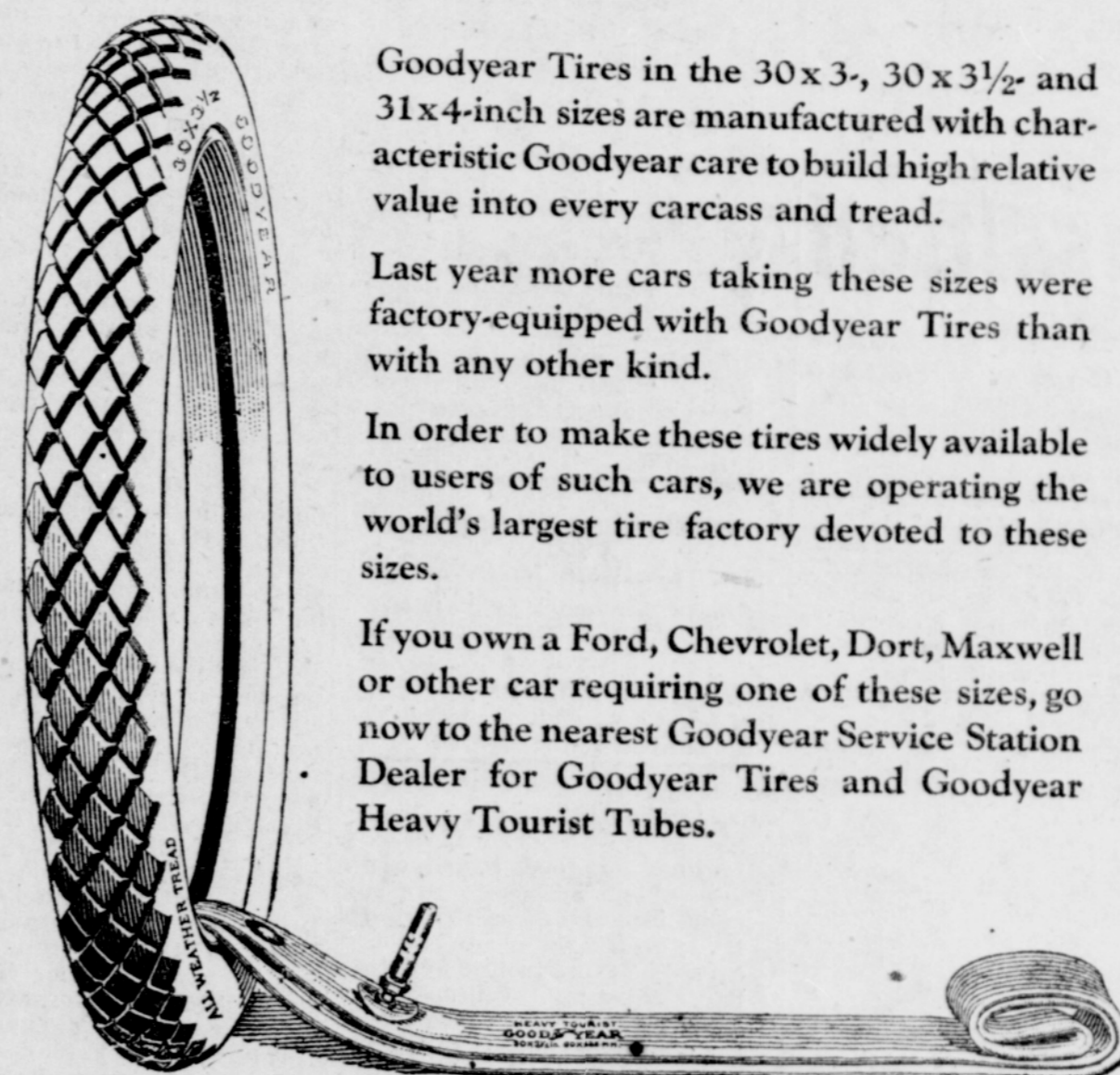
