Natron Cut-Off Work Rumored

ENGENE—Wesley Shelley, of Pleasant Hill, who has been out in the Oakridge district recently, states that a crew of men are at work on the old grade of the Natron cut-off, re-setting stakes on a five-mile stretch of the line from a point near Oakridge toward the summit along Salt Creek. This grade was completed years ago to a point about half way to McCredie Springs and during that period has been used as a road grade. TRY THESE THE NEXT TIME YOU GO A-PICNICING

Ham and Egg Sandwich.
One cup chopped ham, two hard-boiled eggs, one-quarter cup mayonnaise. Chop ham very fine; press the yolks of eggs through a sieve, add to mayonnaise. Chop the whites of eggs very fine and add to mixture, then add ham and mix well. The mayonnaise should be well seasoned with mustard.

Olive and Cheese Sandwich.
Moisten finely chopped stuffed olives with a thick mayonnaise dressing. Spread upon one-half the buttered slices of bread; the remaining slices are spread with cream cheese, then press together in pairs.

Caviar Sandwich.
For each tablespoon of caviar used, add a few drops of onion and lemon juice, then mix well. Spread between thin buttered slices of bread.

Sardine Filling.
Remove bones and rub sardines to a paste. Season with lemon juice and a little Worcestershire sauce.

Cheese and Walnut Sandwich Filling.
One small cream cheese, one-quarter cup butter, one-half cup finely chopped walnuts, salt and paprika. Cream the butter, add cheese, nuts and seasonings. Spread on unbuttered slices of bread.

Fig Sandwich Filling.
Chop one cup figs very fine, add a little water and cook to a paste. Chop very fine one-third cup of blanched almonds, add to the fig paste and season all with a little lemon juice. Cool before using. Raisins or dates may be treated in the same manner.

Cheese Sandwich Filling.
Two tablespoons butter, two tablespoons flour, one-half teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon dry mustard, one cup milk, one cup cheese cut in cubes. Melt the butter, add dry ingredients and mix until smooth. Cook over a slow fire until boiling or frothy, then add cold milk and cheese and stir until thick. Cool and spread between unbuttered slices of bread. The filling should be as thick as the bread.

WENATCHEE PEARS BRING HIGH PRICES

WENATCHEE, Wash.—Virtually all of the pear crop in the Wenatchee district has been sold by growers at from \$75 to \$80 a ton. This is the highest price ever received. The pear crop this year will be 600 carloads, which will return the growers about \$600,000.

The custom of selling pears by the ton is a new one in this district and means that the growers deliver the pears loose to the warehouses without having to pay for boxes or packing. A price of \$80 a ton is equivalent to more than \$250 a box.

BIG MUSICAL COMEDY COMING

Ashland remembers with pleasure "So Long, Letty," the big musical comedy success which played at the Chautauqua auditorium. O. T. Bergner announces that he has secured "Linger Longer Letty," with the same Charlotte Greenwood who played the lead in the previous success, for Ashland. The big musical comedy, probably the largest and best company which will visit the coast this year, will present "Linger Longer Letty" at the Chautauqua Auditorium on Friday, August 31.

Mr. Bergner says, "Don't get the idea that the coming show is the same as the one which was here before. Although the name is similar, it is an entirely new show and is said to have eclipsed the New Work success of 'So Long, Letty.'"

The production was secured for Ashland at great trouble and expense. It makes only one or two one night stops on the coast. The company carries 50 people and two carloads of scenery.

STATE G. O. P. ORGANIZES.

PORTLAND—With the election of officers, the republican state executive committee perfected organization Saturday. This week the preliminaries for the campaign will begin with the opening of headquarters in the Morgan building.

The executive committee consists of the state chairman, national committeeman, secretary, treasurer and 21 others, 11 of whom are state committeemen and the remaining ten are women. The committee yesterday elected Clarence R. Hotchkiss as secretary, and re-elected Arthur Jones as treasurer. O. C. Leiter was selected for publicity manager. The committee has decided to have a bureau of speakers, a bureau of publicity and a bureau for the organization of republican clubs.

At the meeting, Robert N. Stanfield, republican nominee for United States senator, spoke, talking along party lines. The main policy of the campaign committee will be to urge support of the entire republican ticket, with particular reference to electing republican candidates to congress to uphold a republican president.
