WOOL PRODUCTS INCREASE.

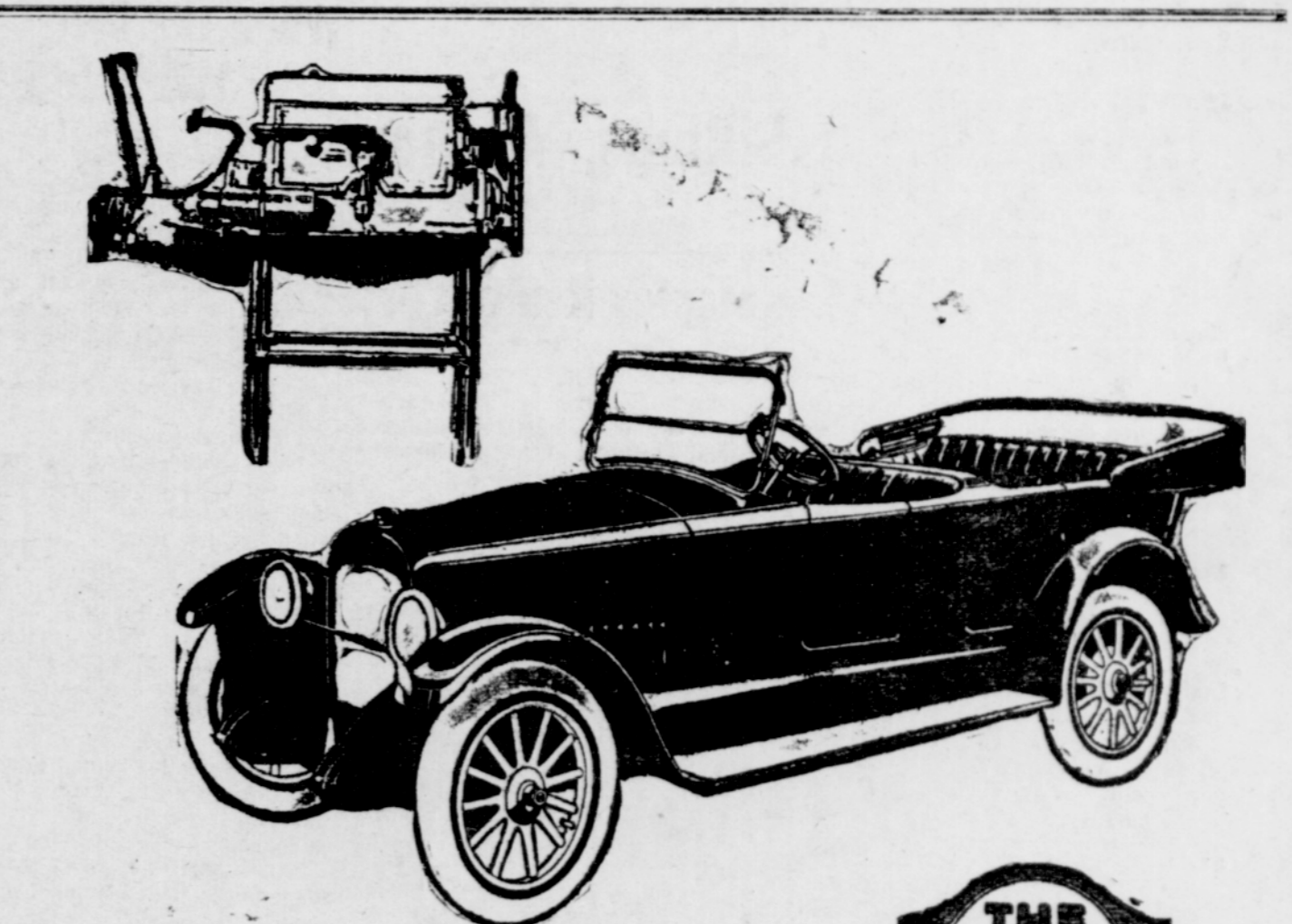
