WHISKER CROP PROMISING

SEATTLE.—Long whiskers and safety razors may become popular in Seattle if the threatened strike of barbers materializes. Journeymen barbers have refused the wage increases offered by the shop owners, and threaten to walk out. The union demanded \$30 a week guarantee, 60 per cent of gross over \$42 and the eight hour day. They were offered \$27 guarantee, 60 per cent over 45 and nine hour day.

COX INVESTIGATES CLOSING OF MILLS

Wild West Division Will Hold Reunion
OAKLAND, Calif.—Veterans of the Ninety-first ("Wild West") division, which was made up of men from the west and trained at Camp Lewis, Tacoma, Wash., are planning to hold their first reunion here September 26, the second anniversary of the Battle of the Argonne, in which the division received its baptism of fire.

General John J. Pershing has been asked to attend. Invitations have also been sent to Major General William H. Johnston, who commanded the division overseas, Lieutenant Hunter Liggett, and the governors of all the states which sent men to make up the division.

TAKE 'EM IN REAR

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The Poles' encircling movement between Demblin and Brest-Litovsk has taken the Russians in the rear, completely shutting off the retreat of the Red Army north of Warsaw, and imprisoning them in a "bottle neck" according to a Warsaw dispatch received here today.

LAUTENBERG IS TAKEN

WRANGEL GETS INTO GAME

PARIS, August 20.—General Wrangel has begun an anti-Bolshevik offensive in the Crimea on a large scale, according to unofficial dispatches the French war office today received.

POLAND WARNED

WASHINGTON, August 20.—Poland has been warned by the United States not to repeat her military advance into Russian territory, it is officially stated here today. Unless the warning is heeded, Poland may prejudice her case in the eyes of the United States, it is stated.

POLES AFTER BETTER TERMS

LONDON, August 20.—That the Polish armistice delegates at Minsk are following out their plan of "marking time" while their armies continue to win further military victories, is indicated in advices received here today.

First Meeting Nation League

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—President Wilson has issued a call for the first meeting of the League of Nations assembly on November 15, the state department today announced. It is understood that Geneva will be the meeting place. The call was sent to Sir Eric Drummond, the league secretary, who must make the text public.

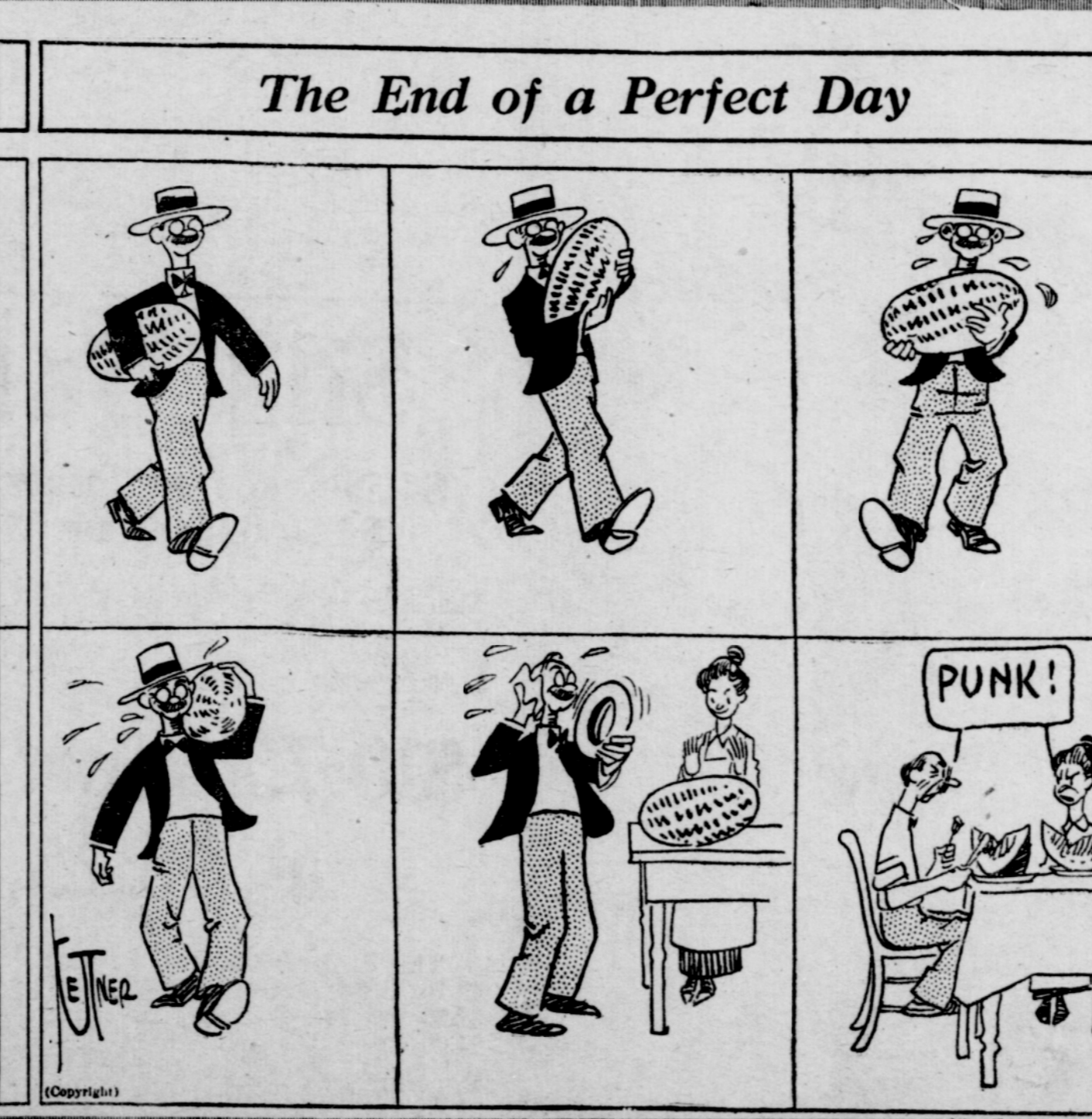
NO NEW MOVE IN SUFF. FIGHT TODAY
