Thirty-six years ago the Indian was given a life sentence when he ambushed and shot dead six of seven Chinese who, he said, had jumped his mining claim in Placer County and killed his broker. Recently he was paroled and taken back to his El Dorado reservation home.  
 On the way to the reservation he stopped here and was taken for an automobile ride. An airplane passed overhead and at a motion picture theatre he witnessed world events pictured on the screen.
