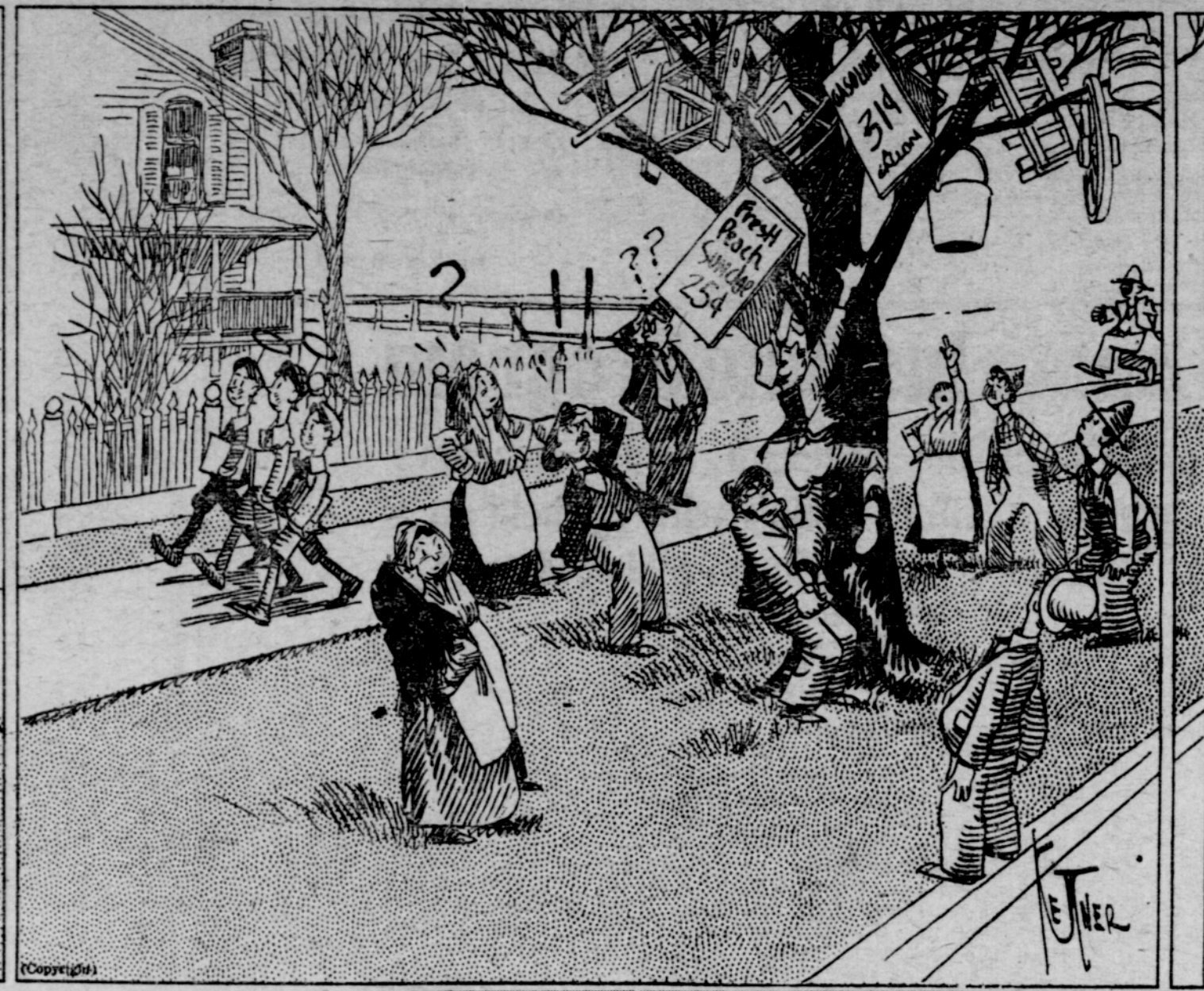

TOPEKA, Kans., Nov. 2—Twenty-nine of 38 precincts gave Harding 1863 and Cox 982.

CASTS REPUBLICAN VOTE FOR SIXTEENTH TIME

Portland, Ore., Nov. 2—Geo. L. Walkington of this city cast his vote for the Republican nominee for president for the sixteenth time today. In 1856, before the Republican party was organized, Walkington voted for Buchanan, the Whig candidate. The following national election, 1860, he voted for Lincoln, the newly formed Republican party candidate, and since that time he has

voted the Republican choice continuously.

Walkington, who is 68 years old, was the son of a Southern family. His father refused to vote the Democratic ticket and was compelled to leave the South as a refugee when the North and the South were at "outs" on the slave question.

Walkington is a pioneer of the West and has lived in Portland for years. His wife also is a strong Republican and will vote for Harding.

SAWMILL IS DESTROYED

GOLD HILL, Nov. 1—Fire of apparently incendiary nature totally destroyed the Rhodes & Cotteral sawmills 12 miles north of Gold Hill in the Meadows district, Thursday evening. The total loss, including lumber in the yards, is about \$80,000, partly covered by insurance. About 500,000 feet of choice pine lumber was saved in the yards.  
This mill was of 40,000 feet capacity and recently equipped with new machinery. It has been operated two years, the entire output going to the Medford box factories.
