School Has Practice House In Domestic Science Course

In accordance with the Smith-Hughes act, which was discussed in these columns a month ago, District No. 5 qualified this year as a Smith-Hughes unit in domestic science.

This means that every girl passing through our high school has the advantage of federal aid applied to her course in household economics through the medium of a practice house.

It had been the plan of the school board to remodel an old house which stood on school property, but the high cost of construction made it seem more practical to rent a house. Fortunately the board was able to secure a seven-room house, No. 925 on the Boulevard, which is fairly well adapted to the purpose and is easily accessible to the high school campus.

The underlying idea in the Smith-Hughes legislation is for the girls to have actual practice in running a home along simple lines—just such a home as the majority of our girls make for themselves in later years. To this end the house has been furnished very simply but tastefully.

In order to plan and work for a household, a family must be organized, so four of the high school teachers are boarding at the practice house. One of the four is Miss Evangelina Poley, an accredited Smith-Hughes teacher, who is house-moth-

er, and has full charge and oversight of the house.

The girls of the senior class work in the practice house in groups of four. Each girl spends her first week in care of the upstairs rooms, acting as housemaid. The second week she has similar duties downstairs. Her third week she is purchasing agent and assistant at cooking and the fourth week she is entirely responsible for the cooking.

The whole assignment, then, in the practice house includes the ordinary processes of the home, the care of the house, purchasing of supplies, the balanced meal, household accounts and all the common problems of the home.

The course has proved to be so popular that when Miss Poley lately asked for volunteers for the practice house, every girl in the class volunteered.

On Friday afternoon, beginning at half past two o'clock, the Parent-Teacher's association will hold open house at the practice house. Besides having an opportunity to inspect the house, the women of the city will have an opportunity to meet Miss Bertha Davis, who is in charge of Smith-Hughes work in the state. Miss Davis will speak briefly at 3:15 and again at 4:00. All women are invited.

ANCIENT POMP AT LORD MAYOR'S SHOW IN LONDON

(By the United Press) LONDON, Nov. 10.—With centuries old civic pomp and pageantry Alderman James Roll was yesterday inaugurated Lord Mayor of London for the ensuing year. The picturesque "Lord Mayor's Show"—a two mile procession which annually dislocates traffic in the heart of the most congested districts of the City of London—attracted the usual masses of sightseers, although it is the usual thing for Londoners to shrug their shoulders and profess to regard it as a tiresome anachronism, "not worth going to see, my boy." However, no Lord Mayor has yet been bold enough to cut out this expensive pageant, and it is certain that all true Cockneys would protest loudly if the ancient ritual was dropped.

Lord Mayor Rolls is an insurance company magnate, having been managing director of the Pearl Insurance Company, with which concern he was connected for 50 years. The son of a Norfolk farmer, he came to London as a boy of 14, and—as he puts it himself—"By hard work and a little luck" he worked himself up from the humblest position. He is a typical Englishman of the Dickensian style, rather like the late King Edward in manners and appearance. He is passionately fond of horses and coaching, and despite his 72 years, is still a famous whip.

The office of Lord Mayor is no sinecure. Nor is it a profitable one; for although there is a salary of ten thousand pounds for the year, the occupant of the Mansion House generally has to spend four or five times that amount as official "host" for the City of London.

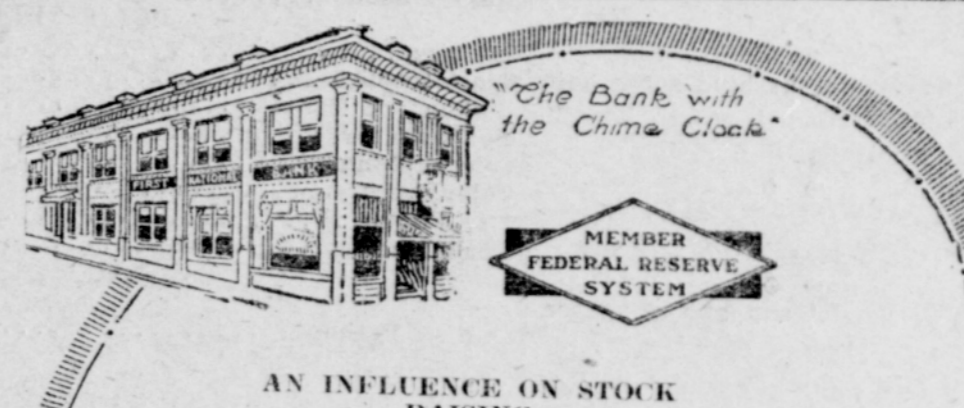
