that is the unassimilatable factor in this part of the world. The Levantine alone is enough to discourage those who hope to see Smyrna and the Asia Minor coastline become purely Hellenic again—if it ever was. Non-national and usually multi-racial, the Levantine owes allegiance to no country and refuses to recognize the authority of none. Under the Ottoman rule he was virtually unmoored. Under inter-allied control he expects a sort of millennium, with maximum privileges and a minimum of obligations and restrictions. "We don't want more liberty, we want more money for our olive oil," is the context of an actual message received by King Constantine in Athens, shortly after his return, when he promised revision of the constitution along more democratic lines.
