Rogue River Cows Winners in Butter Fat Production

For the fourth consecutive month, the Rogue River cow-testing association won the February championship for both the highest average butterfat production and the largest number of honor cows that yield 40 or more pounds of fat per month.

The entire number of cows tested in February was 1502, and their average fat production was 22.80 pounds, reports E. B. Fitts, federal and agricultural college extension dairyman for Oregon.

One hundred and seven cows made the honor mark, Clatsop county being a close second to Rogue River with 24.

Clatsop county, 372 cows; Tillamook, 258; Nestucca, 122; Smith-Umpqua, 71; Coquille & Myrtle Point No. 1, (no report); Coos Bay, 159; Rogue River, 230; Bandon Cooperative, 67; Columbia county, 233.

The heaviest yield of fat made by a registered cow was taken for the fourth consecutive time by P. A. Lux's "Dolly Dimple of Rock Run," a registered Jersey.

BEWILDERING TO THE MIND

Everyday Measurements of Science That Are Almost Beyond Comprehension of the Layman.

One great difficulty in the study of astronomy is to comprehend the immensity of the distances and sizes involved. For instance, we can form no conception of the size or distance of the sun.

Suppose there was a spherical shell of the diameter of the sun. Suppose a great globe should drop into this shell, every second, night and day, a ball the size of the earth.

Astronomically speaking, the above distance is very short. The sun is our nearest star. Strain the imagination by trying to comprehend the velocity of light which would pass seven times around the earth in one second of time.

GERMANY LOSING RADIUM SUPPLY

BERLIN, Mar. 28.—Once the chief producer of radium, Germany now has barely enough to meet the medical demands of the great universities. There is only one gram of radium in all Berlin, and proportionately even less at Heidelberg and other university cities.

The shortage is said to be due to the fact that karnothit, used in the manufacture of radium, is no longer imported from America. The Germans say the United States could supply plenty of karnothit, but in view of the low purchasing power of the mark the Germans cannot afford to buy it.

Claims Fair Sex Makes Good Jurors

SEATTLE, Wash., Mar. 29.—Women as trial jurors were praised by Prosecuting Attorney Douglas in his reply to a questionnaire sent him by the Oregon Women's Christian Temperance Union which sought information relative to the referendum to be submitted to the voters of Oregon on a bill which the legislature passed authorizing women to serve on juries.

The prosecuting attorney, in supplying the information, based on experience in local courts, did not rely on his experience alone, but consulted judges and attorneys generally.

"The writer has not noticed any traits that are peculiar to women as jurors," stated Douglas, "to any great extent. It is my belief that they are, to some degree, inclined to be more severe in criminal cases than men."
