




Encouraging the Hen.

"Automobile" Street Car.

Mechanical arrangement similar in many respects to that of an automobile is the distinguishing feature of a new form of gasoline-driven interurban car described in Popular Mechanics Magazine. Though the body, scating 35 passengers, is like that of a standard modern street car, there is a long bood extending in front, in which the 50-horsepower engine is mounted. and a shaft transmits the power to the rear wheels. Air brakes, electric lights, and a hot water heating plant are other details of the equipment.
