OREGON GETS SHARE OF NEW FARM LOAN

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Eight or nine million dollars will be made available for federal farm loan bank loans in Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho from the bond issue to be sold by the federal farm loan board April 15, according to present estimates, but some of this money may not be available until July. This information was furnished Senator McNary by the federal farm loan board in response to an inquiry as to additional farm loans for the Ochoco irrigation project in the Prineville country. Loans were suspended until the dam there could be approved by Mr. McKittrick, the engineer appraiser of the Spokane headquarters, and this will be done soon. What proportion of this \$3,000,000 will go to Oregon cannot now be determined, but the board estimates that applications now on file from Oregon would absorb the total amount, and it will have to be pro-rated among the four states.

MARRIED WOMEN'S HIRE OPTIONAL

SEATTLE, Wash., April 12.—County commissioners have not the power to prohibit the employment of married women in county offices, and have not the authority to use their salary-fixing power to compel county officers to employ or not to employ a certain class of individuals, according to an opinion rendered by Attorney General Thompson to Mrs. Josephine Corliss Preston, state superintendent of public instruction. The Clarke county commissioners adopted a resolution stating it was against public policy for county officers to employ married women whose husbands can support them, and that, if married women were so hired, they should receive only 50 per cent of the salary paid to persons holding similar positions. "The question of the desirability of employing married women in county elective offices is a matter for the consideration of the individual officers and not for the county commissioners," the attorney general wrote.
