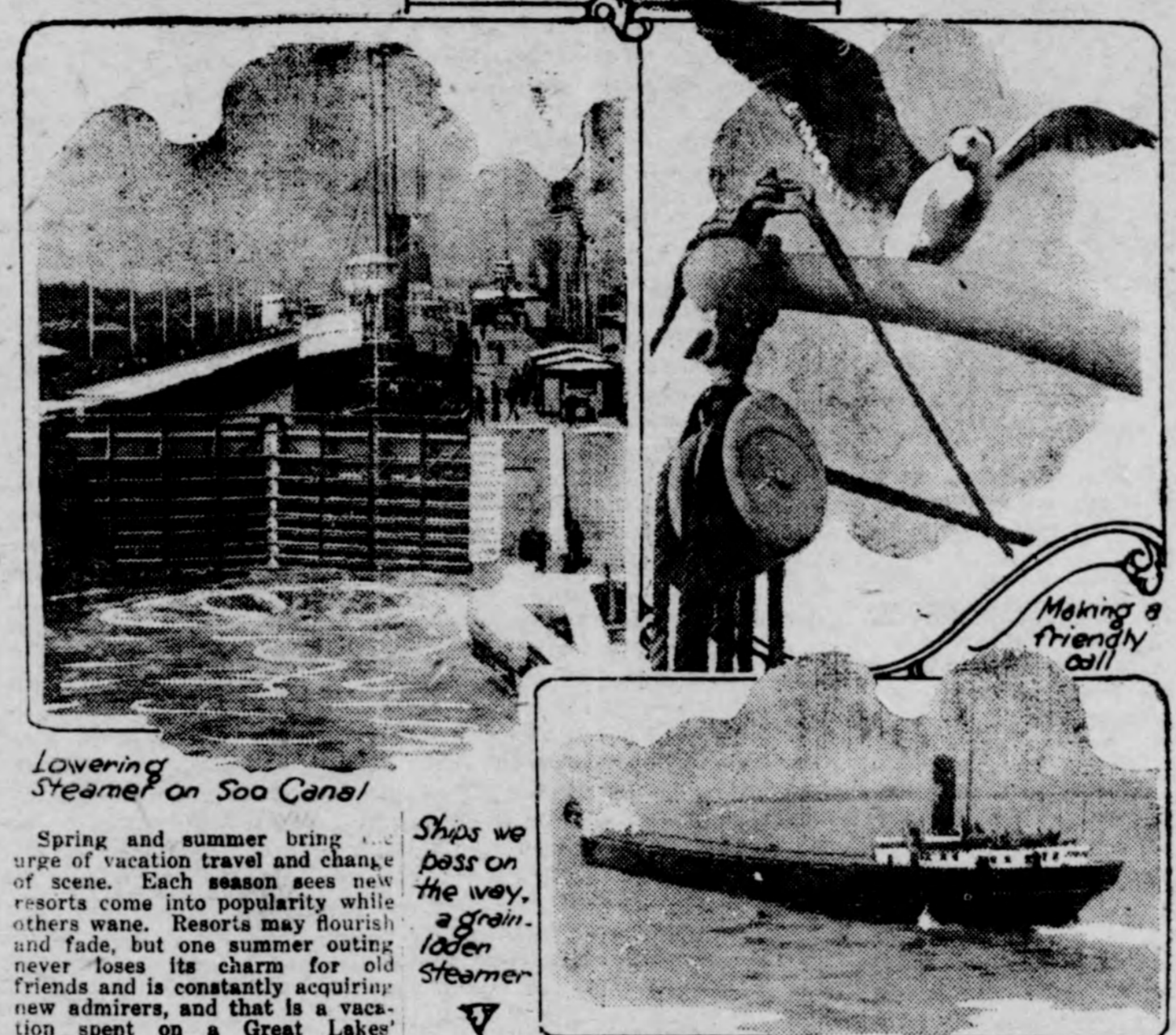

Lowering Steamer on Soo Canal

Spring and summer bring the urge of vacation travel and change of scene. Each season sees new resorts come into popularity while others wane. Resorts may flourish and fade, but one summer outing never loses its charm for old friends and is constantly acquiring new admirers, and that is a vacation spent on a Great Lakes steamer.

Thousands of vacationists from the middle states make the trip from Chicago or Milwaukee to beautiful Georgian Bay with its Thousand Islands clustered about Ontario's resort dotted shore. Other thousands, sailing from Buffalo, Toronto or Port McNicoll, head westward and northward through Erie and Huron into that inland sea of dark blue water, Lake Superior.

The round trip from Port McNicoll on Georgian Bay, to Port William at the head of Lake Superior makes an ideal week's outing. The lake steamers are comfortable and equipped with all the comforts and luxuries of ocean liners, also some unique to themselves such as out-door dancing space on the after-deck and dining salons fitted with large plate glass windows through which wide views of the fact that during 1919, vessels to the number of 17,587 and 56,992 passengers passed through its locks. Vast quantities of freight also find their way to market via this man-made waterway which supplanted the dangerous rapids that connected the two lakes and at one time isolated the greatest of the Great Lakes.

Federal Reserve Misunderstood By Merchants

KANSAS CITY, May 13. — The federal reserve bank system is most generally misunderstood, not only by merchants and farmers, but even by bankers of the country, said C. A. Worthington, deputy governor of the Federal Reserve Bank here, in an address to credit men. The idea that the Federal Reserve Bank has not made loans for the purchase of agricultural equipment and backed the farmer to the limit is erroneous, he said, setting out that the local branch last year alone furnished more than 20 times the amount of funds to this district than ever was placed in banks for crop moving or other purposes prior to the establishment of the federal reserve system.

"It required more money to handle agricultural loans last year, than ever before," said Mr. Worthington. "At one time our loans aggregated more than 165 millions."

The Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City was required to borrow 50 millions from other districts, Mr. Worthington said. All other reserve banks in agricultural sections were borrowers also.

"The fundamental objects in establishing the Federal Reserve Bank was to furnish elastic currency, to afford means of rediscounting commercial paper and to establish more effective supervision of banking in the United States," continued Mr. Worthington. "The idea, however, that the federal reserve banks handle all kinds of commercial paper is not correct. Any banking system would collapse under such a strain."
