Remarkable Example of Prehistoric "Art" That Was Found Recently in Central France.

A few weeks ago a number of remarkable drawings were found in a prehistoric cave near Ponceur, in central France. They were drawn on the shoulder blade of a mammoth.

DECLARE WAGE CUTTING IS AID TO UNION RANKS

DENVER, Colo., June 13.—Labor leaders at the American Federation of Labor convention, opening today, declare that large employers wage cutting tactics has aided organized labor in the fight waged against the open shop.

Matthew Woll, vice president of the federation, told the United Press today that "arbitrary wage reductions without consultation or consideration" greatly strengthened the ranks of Unionism.

The wage cutting and unemployment solution hinges upon the decision on this question. President Gompers is expected to give a speech at the opening meeting and may outline his attitude toward re-election to the presidency.

Phillip Trefren Fallen Ashland Soldier Buried

The funeral of Phillip Trefren, the first Ashland boy killed in France in the Vosges to be returned here for burial, was held yesterday afternoon at two o'clock from the Presbyterian

church, Rev. Koehler officiating. The funeral was under the auspices of the Ashland post of the American Legion and was conducted in a semi-military manner.
