FAMOUS FRENCH REGIMENT PASSES

PARIS, July 7.—One of the most picturesque regiments of the French army, the Second Hussars, has just had its disbandment ordered by the war ministry. It must, according to the order, be absolutely dissolved by August 1.

The regiment was first known as the Chamberant Hussars, named for its commander in 1761, the Marquis of Chamberant. In those days the troopers wore fine high shakoes like the West Point cadets, great furry affairs floating from their shoulders, and chestnut brown dolmans. Garbed in that operatic regalia, they fought through all the wars of the Revolution and those of Napoleon. One of their exploits was to relieve the Dutch fleet which had been icebound at Texel.

The Second also fought under the third Napoleon at Solferino, and at Mars-la-Tour against the Germans in 1871. And it served all through the great war—in simple horizon blue, instead of in the gaudy regalia of former days. Before Alilly-sur-Noye in 1918 the Second left 75 of its effectives on the field of battle.

The French press and public is practically unanimous in declaring that with the passing of the Second Hussars, quite a little of the martial glory of France will pass away as well.

FOOD PRICES BEGIN TO FALL IN GERMANY

BERLIN, July 8.—A slight sinking of prices for the most important foods is noted in the German markets. Statistics show that with the exception of bread, the necessities have dropped about 15 per cent since the first of the year. Bread and coal, however, cost slightly more than January 1.

Butter was released to June from government control, with the result that considerable can now be purchased in the stores openly and at lower prices than previously. The price dropped within a few days from 35 marks to 22 marks a pound. Restrictions on rationing of milk have also been decreased, though a certain governmental control is still maintained so that the poor may not be victims of profiteering and so that they may be assured a proper quantity of milk for their children.

To enable patrons of the Tidings to easily comply with this ruling this office has put in a supply of the standard sizes of butter paper and will print it in lots of 100 sheets and upward and deliver it by parcels post at the following prices:

100 Sheets, 16 or 32 ounces\$1.75
150 Sheets, 16 or 32 ounces\$2.75
500 Sheets, 16 or 32 ounces\$4.00
