moddy marketing organization. It is patterned somewhat after the California associations and some of the middle western wool marketing associations, which have made a signal success for their members.

The affairs of the association are managed by experienced wool men and business men, and it has the endorsement of leading bankers, wool-growers and business men.

Over 700,000 pounds of members' wools are now being graded. Formerly these wools were sold ungraded, and buyers bought on the basis of the value of the poorest fleeces in the sack.

This was a business necessity because of the great irregularity of wools and the bad condition in which they usually came into the market.

However, this practice on the whole penalized every careful grower and resulted in considerable loss to sheep men. All association wools are graded by Boston experts and put in merchantable condition, which greatly enhances their value.

After grading and baling, the wool also takes a considerable lower rate east which makes an additional saving for sheepmen.

The wools are handled in a licensed U. S. wool warehouse, graded and weighed by licensed graders and weighers which insures fair and impartial handling to all shippers.

Through the medium of licensed warehouse receipts which show the quantity and quality of each grade of wool, advances are being secured to take care of growers until
