THREE CANDIDATES IN LINE FOR JOB AS POSTMASTER AT JACKSONVILLE; VACANT NOW

The naming of a new postmaster for Jacksonville is one of the problems to be settled soon by the administration, and who will be the recipient of the federal plum is a question. There are a number of candidates, avowed and unavowed, the chief of the former class being John F. Miller, a former holder of the job, Louis Ulrich, the present incumbent, and F. J. Fick, a merchant of the county seat. The berth pays \$1400 a year.

The term of Mr. Ulrich has expired, but he is holding over till the new selection is made. He has held the job eight years. Messrs. Miller and Fick are of the republican stripe. The Jacksonville postoffice, besides handling the county and city mail, also serves the Applegate and Blue Ledge districts.

Grand Jury Recesses—Foreman Eldon of the special session of the grand jury, which adjourned yesterday afternoon without returning any indictments or making a report, informed the jurors that they might be called again in a few days. The session was devoted to investigation of the Bank of Jacksonville failure and to the sheriff's office. It is probable that all the county offices will be investigated.
