G. A. Gardner, county judge of Jackson county, accompanied by Mr. Fisher, secretary of the state tax commission, arrived here this afternoon from Ashland to transact business with local people. Judge Gardner, stated that he and the two Jackson county commissioners, James Owens of Eagle Point, and Victor Bursell of Central Point, were much interested in the completion of the connecting links of the Green Springs Mountain road between Ashland and Klamath Falls, which was started three seasons ago. By fall 1 1/2 miles will be finished and the contracts let for the macadamizing of 7 1/2 miles of roads west from Keene creek, which will make it an all macadamized road from the Pacific highway. The section between Keene creek and Pinehurst, six miles in length, will be open for travel in two weeks.—Medford Mail Tribune.

**U. OF O. TO HAVE  
BLIND INSTRUCTOR  
FOR NEXT YEAR**

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., July 16.—A blind instructor will teach at the University of Oregon next year, it has been announced. Thomas D. Cutsforth, of Riddle, Or., and an alumnus of the university, will be graduate assistant in the department of psychology.  
In spite of total blindness, he won a reputation for scholarship while a student at the university and contributed in an important way to the psychology of the blind. Upon graduation he became a teacher in the high school at Riddle, Or. In addition to teaching ancient, medieval, and modern, English and American history, civics, biology with laboratory, and general science with laboratory, he introduced wrestling into the high school and coached it. He later introduced soccer and coached it also. He is probably the only blind athletic coach in the state.  
With unseeing eyes, but with a wide capacity for enjoyment, he spends his summer vacations fishing, hunting and hiking. He says he has

taken in nearly everything in Southern Oregon. In his rambles through the mountains he has picked up an interesting collection of fossil marine animals for use in his general science and biology classes.  
Mr. Cutsforth will take up his duties at the University of Oregon at the beginning of the fall term, the 24th of September.

**DE VALERA DEMANDS THAT  
HE BE RECEIVED AS SOLE  
IRISH REPRESENTATIVE**

LONDON, July 16.—Eamonn De Valera, president of the "Irish republic," arrived at Premier Lloyd George's office today to confer further regarding a British-Irish peace. The first obstacle to be overcome is determining Ulster's share in the negotiations, De Valera insisting that he be treated as a representative of the whole of Ireland, not as chief merely of the southern counties. Premier Craig is remaining in Ireland awaiting invitation to the conference, which he has not received as yet.

**ROGUE RIVER VALLEY WILL  
HAVE LARGE CROP APPLES**

(Continued From Page One)

The data of the bureau is especially interesting to the Rogue River growers in that it shows that nearly 30 per cent of the apples in the country are northwestern box apples. Washington, Idaho, Oregon and California have practically full crops, while New York and the Virginias are light except in certain limited areas. The middle western states from Michigan to the Ozarks are practically a blank, the government experts say.

Present indications are that the crop will return considerably in excess of \$2,000,000 to the growers here this year. This estimate is based upon apples bringing \$1000 per car and pears from \$900 to \$1500 per car.

Prospects for high prices for Rogue River pears, particularly Bartlett's, were never better at this season, according to the opinion of resident shippers.

This prediction is based upon the general crop failure throughout the middle western and eastern districts and the short crop in California. While there was a fair crop—about 75 per cent of normal—in the Sacramento river section in California, a said.

month ago, the tonnage from that district was cut down from 30 to 40 per cent by a young cyclone which swept through the valley July 4. The Suisun, Lake county, El Dorado county and Tehachapi crops, which ordinarily arrive in the eastern markets with Rogue River pears, have less than a 20 per cent crop. The first auction reports of the season point to high prices, it is said.
