FARM REMINDERS. Lime lessens plant disease, such as rust, smut and clubroot, and it also makes available for plant growth such food elements as potassium, phosphorus, and other mineral elements in acid soils available for plant growth. The lime also increases the moisture content of the top layer

ers of heavy soils.—O. A. C. experiment station.

The time to use lime depends primarily upon convenience, although the fall or spring is usually considered a better time to apply lime as it can be spread and harrowed in after the seed bed has been prepared. Lime should never be plowed under because it works downward and naturally leaches into the lower layers of the soil. Farmers who expect to use lime this fall should order their lime within the next five or six weeks if they expect to get in time for fall use.—O. A. C. experiment station.
