The second brood of codling moth are emerging and eggs will be hatching from about the 25th of July for several weeks. This brood will string along similar to the first brood with a maximum part of the hatching comng about the first ten days in August. It will be necessary to spray again at this time and follow it up in about three weeks.

On account of having to wipe the arsenate off of all fruit that is shipped east, we are recommending the use of four pounds of dry arsenate of lead to two hundred gallons in combination with Spreado at the rate of two pounds to the two hundred gallons. There are several tracts of early pears in the valley that it will not be necessary to spray at this time. But late pears, and all apples should be sprayed and old Bartletts and some younger tracts that are close in to apple orchards.

Orchardists who feel that their pears are clean at this time and think that they can omit this spray should communicate with the pathologist at an early date in regard to this matter.
