Crater Lake Road To Be Sprinkled, Co. Court Order

At a meeting of the county court Tuesday a sprinkler was ordered placed on the Crater Lake highway between the Dodge bridge and Long bridge to settle the dust. This is a new stretch of road and has been the source of some complaint from tourists, being the dustiest stretch on the way to the scenic wonder. By use of water, this will be eliminated and the road material hardened. A new road was ordered established between Dodge's bridge and the new Crater Lake highway, in the Eagle Point district, producing a direct route from Bybee's bridge to the highway, and doing away with some hill climbing.

A contract was granted Chris Natwick for the hauling of gravel from Reese creek to put on the Reese Creek road. This will be finished before winter. The supervisor was ordered to make the necessary repairs on the Trail road at once, and before the winter rains. Citizens of that section recently appeared before the court and testified that the road was in bad shape, and that they risked their lives and limbs in attempting to travel over it in bad weather. The repairs will be temporary. A large batch of bills were considered, approved and disapproved.

ABILITY OF EXHIBITOR TO HANDLE ENTRY WILL COUNT IN AWARDED PRIZES THIS YEAR

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Or., July 21.—Special pig showing contests will be held next fall at all county fairs, state fair, and the Pacific International Livestock show, to be open to all members of boys' and girls' clubs who show purebred pigs of any recognized breed. Heretofore very little attention has been given by the judges to the manner of showing the animals. Judges will consider 50 per cent for preparing the pig to show under the following points: condition of feet and trimming of toes, trimming of ears and tail; washing and cleanliness of ears, belly, head and flanks, and condition of coat, including gloss, excess of oil and use of objectionable materials. The remaining 50 per cent will be based on the showing of the pig, including control of animal by the exhibitor; poise and coolness of exhibitor; skill in showing, including continuous attention, keeping the pig placed to advantage, and being on the job, and ability to stand, move or drive the pig as requested by the judge.

THE AMERICAN JERSEY CATTLE CLUB IS GIVING \$2500 IN CASH FOR PRIZES

The American Jersey cattle club is giving \$2500 in cash for prizes this year, to be divided among the county clubs at county fairs in the fall. The clubs will be divided into two classes: Class "A" with a membership of not less than 20, will receive \$50, while class "B" clubs with not less than 12 members, will receive \$25.

Meetings with livestock clubs, for consideration of livestock judging teams will be held by county club leaders the last week of July. A livestock judging team will represent each club at the county fair. The high point team at the county fair may choose to go to the state fair or the Pacific International Livestock show. The team making second place will have second choice.

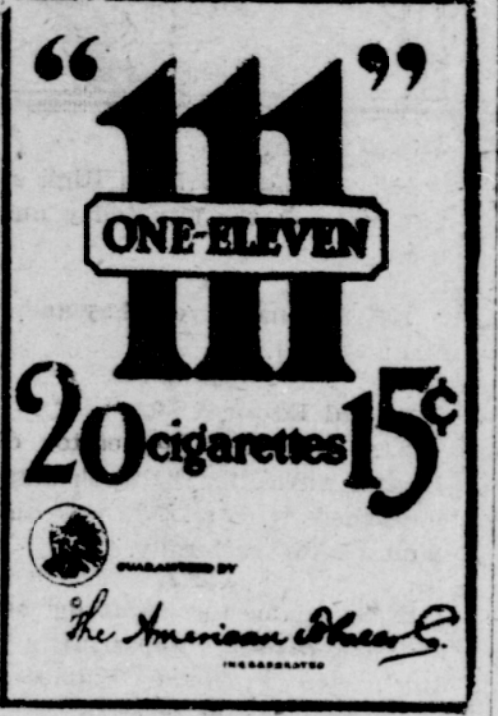
DEPORTATION OF JAPANESE MELON PICKERS BY WHITE WORKERS CAUSE FLIGHT

TURLOCK, Calif., July 21.—The deportation of fifty-eight Japanese melon pickers by loading them into a north-bound train, following the anger of union white melon pickers at the growers for employing Japs to the whites' exclusion in the melon fields, has caused a wholesale flight of Japanese from the Turlock fruit territory. Word concerning the midnight raid spread quickly and with an immediate effect on the "little brown men." One hundred of the Japanese pickers fled, only those who are leasing or working their own land remaining. No violence has been reported.

BUFFALO, N. Y., BANKS ARE HEAVILY ARMED

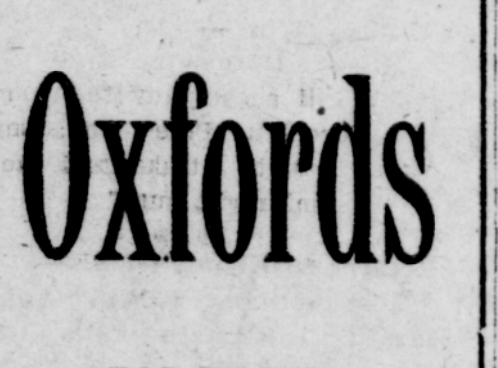
BUFFALO, N. Y., July 21.—Due to the number of increasing bank robberies throughout the United States, Buffalo banking institutions have installed many safety devices to insure against robbery. Sharpshooters armed with auto-

matic rifles, barricaded in an armor plate cage above the corridor of the Federal Reserve bank, are on guard to frustrate possible attacks by armed bandits. The "pill box" contains seven loop holes and looks like a world war fortification. Any point in the bank is a target for the man in the cage. Additional night guards have been placed in banks and they are now armed with sawed-off shot guns. Besides visible means of warding off attacks the banks have installed secret appliances that would bring police instantly to the bank where an attack was made and other appliances that would trap the robbers.
