**REPORT OF STEAMER SINKING WITHOUT FOUNDATION; SHIP RETURNS UNDER OWN POWER**

PORTLAND, Or., July 21.—An Associated Press report of the sinking of the steamer Effingham in the Columbia river, when she ran aground on the rocks near Stella, Wash., is unfounded. The vessel was damaged but proceeded to Portland under her own power.

PORTLAND, Or., July 21.—The steamer Effingham, reported to have been sunk in the Lower Columbia, suffered slight damage to the hull plates in addition to slight machinery damage. The ship will be seaworthy again in a few days. A word report that the vessel had gone down and that the crew had escaped with difficulty, was without foundation. The vessel ran aground on the rocks when the steering gear broke, but backed off under her own power and returned to Portland.

**WILL PROSECUTE MOB MEMBERS ATTACKING JAP MELON PICKERS**

TURLOCK, Calif., July 21.—Sheriff Dalla, Stanislaus county, is making a determined effort to apprehend the leaders and members of a band that deported fifty-eight Japanese melon pickers yesterday when they undercut the price of white labor. Armed with "John Doe" warrants, Dallas says there will be no whitewashing the affair and expects to make numerous arrests. Some Japanese have returned to the melon patches, although they still show fear of being attacked by the white laborers. The Japanese consulate is aiding the investigation.

SALEM, Or., July 21.—Five per cent of the receipts from the sales of public lands in Oregon, during the years ending June 30, 1919, and June 30, 1920, aggregating \$6630.56, has been apportioned by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, to the various counties of the state.

Under the law this apportionment is based on the area of public lands in each county, there being a total of 61,188,480 acres of these lands in the state.

Jackson county's share is \$196.65, on an acreage of 1,618,040.

Bert Moses Gives Advertising Talk To Medford C. of C.

"Community Advertising" was the subject of a talk made to the Medford Chamber of Commerce yesterday noon by Bert Moses, of this city, and well known as the syndicate writer of "Sap and Salt in the Woods," a newspaper feature being sold to various papers throughout the country.

"The worst thing that can happen to a community," said Mr. Moses, "was to contract the 'village habit,' and be satisfied with things as they were when Grandpa was a boy. One result of this habit is a flock of prominent citizens who are so busy being prominent they can't do anything else. They also develop the meddler's itch and split up into cliques, and spread false tales about those who are endeavoring to help the community."

Another affliction of the "village habit," Mr. Moses said, was the passage of innumerable ordinances that made "life just one don't after another."
