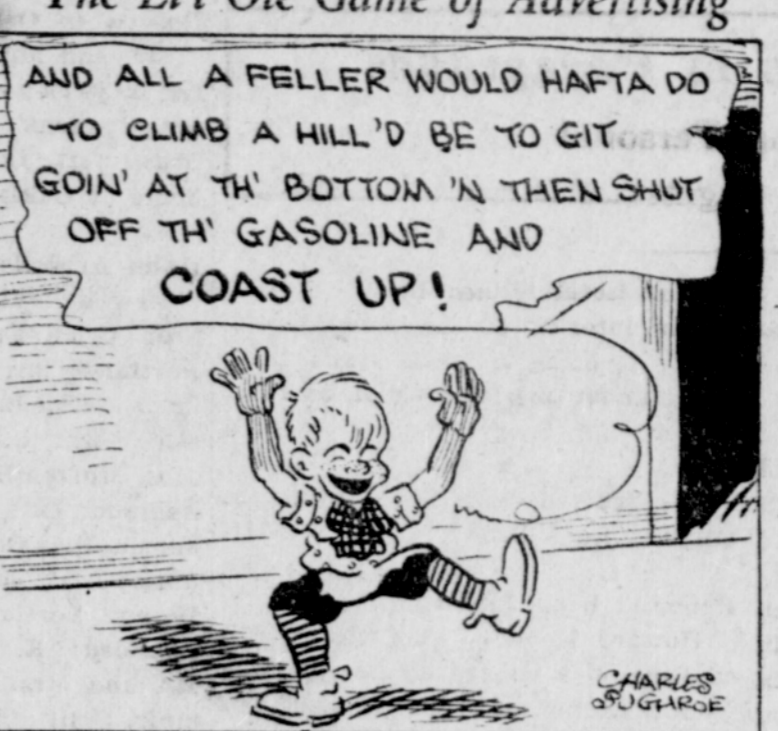
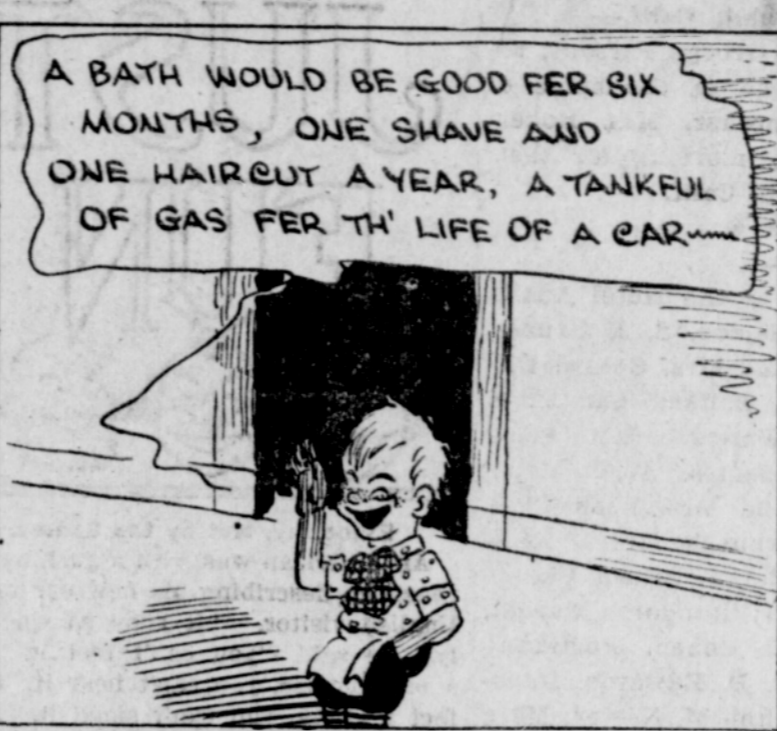

Recorder's Office, Ashland, Oregon, July 15, 1921.
Sealed proposals will be received by the common council of the city of Ashland, Oregon, until 5 o'clock p. m., Tuesday, July 26, 1921, at the recorder's office in the city hall, and such proposals will be opened and considered the same day and date at 8 o'clock p. m., for the construction and installing of a sewer, all pipe to be furnished by the city and all other material by the contractor. Said sewer is to be built on Meade street from a point about 50 feet north of Iowa street northerly to a point about 50 feet north of Summit street, a total distance of about 550 feet, according to plans and specifications on file in the office of the city recorder.
The whole cost incurred in the construction and installation of said sewer and all expenses incident thereto are to be paid by special assessment and levy on the property specially benefitted thereby in proportion to the respective benefits thereto.
All bids must be addressed to the city recorder and marked "Proposal to Construct Sewer."
A certified check for \$25.00, payable to the city of Ashland must accompany all bids, which amount the successful bidder shall forfeit to the city in case he shall fail to execute a contract and furnish an approved bond for the faithful performance of such contract within five days after notification of acceptance of the bid.

Weekly Report on Condition of the Pacific Highway

To the editor:
As to the condition of the Pacific highway between Roseburg and the California line as of July 24, beg to report as follows

Roseburg-Myrtle Creek, 20 miles—Paving south of Roseburg; open at all hours; detours are used when available.

Myrtle Creek-Canyonville, 10 miles—Grading; fair detours via Riddle. Canyonville-Galesville, 11 miles—Good macadam.

Galesville-Wolf Creek, 14 miles—Paving; in progress at both ends of job; where detours are not available traffic will be allowed to pass at least every two hours.

Wolf Creek-Graves Creek, 5 miles—Paved.

Graves Creek-Grants Pass, 18 miles—Being macadamized; take old road at summit of Smith hill.

Grants Pass-Ashland, 43 miles—Paved.

Ashland-California Line, 22 miles—The missing gaps in the pavement south of Ashland have been filled in except about one half mile on the top of the Siskiyou at which point Mr. Huber's forces are now working.

Crater Lake Highway
The Crater Lake road is open to the lake. Due to excessive dust from Dodge bridge to the ferry, the route from Medford to Eagle Point,

thence via Reese Creek school house to McLeod bridge is to be preferred. K. E. HODGMAN, Division Engineer.

NEW TRADE POLICY SAID TO HAVE UNDERMINED LEADER OF BOLSHEVIKS

RIGA, July 23.—Newspapers now appearing in Moscow give some inkling of the struggle in Russia during the first two months of the attempt to restore something like normal civilization along the line of Lenin's new policy of freedom of trade, and at the same time retain power in the hands of the communists. Reform after reform has been announced, but the Moscow papers say that difficulties are arising at every turn.

Lenine, hopeful of success, is keeping his pen busy day and night writing articles explaining why the reforms were necessary and urging the peasants to support him.

Seeklov and other more radical writers, however, are filling the Pravda and Izvestia with arguments in which they attempt to show that free trade already has proved an utter failure. They are also adopting the "I told you so" attitude and suggesting the return to ironclad communism.

During the period of transition no American or other foreign news correspondents were admitted into Russia and only occasional news admissions or editorial controversy is printed in the Moscow press.

The Moscow Economic Life of May 5 displays hopefully an account of

a peasants' conference which agreed on the necessity of the non-partisans working with the communists to restore Russia; but other papers editorially bemoan the fact that "the peasants are not interested and won't do anything at all."

The information from independent sources, however, indicates that Lenine has no real opposition that he could not sweep away quickly and that the situation is now entirely up to him. He is being guarded more closely than ever, in view of the rumors in Moscow of a new plot to assassinate him and other commissaries.
