BUST OF WASHINGTON OVERLOOKS WELLINGTON'S TOMB IN ST. PAUL'S

LONDON, July 23.—The placing of a bust of George Washington close to the tombs of Nelson and Wellington, in St. Paul's cathedral, was accompanied by a message from President Harding in which he voiced the hope that this gift from Americans might "inspire a continued reciprocation of the established friendship of the American people for the British nation." The sentiment is welcomed in Great Britain. It is approved in this country by all except those who are engaged in a malign effort to stir up hatred between the two countries.

The Washington bust is suitably placed in St. Paul's. Other busts were simultaneously unveiled at the ancestral home of the Washington family at Sulgrave manor, and in the town hall at Liverpool. St. Paul's is the shrine where Britain entombs her men of action, and Washington was pre-eminently a man of action. When the news of his death reached England, the nation he had fought and from whom he had wrested its fairest colonies, paid tribute to him by half-masting flags on its warships and firing minute guns. Englishmen have so long recognized the greatness of Washington that the placing of a memorial in one of Britain's two Pantheons is natural and appropriate. Whittier sang of the common heritage of American people in the thought and action of the older land:

We, too, are heirs of Runnymede, And Shakespeare's fame and Cromwell's deed Are not alone our mother's.

And it was a distinguished English visitor to America who calculated that Great Britain owed an incalculable debt to Washington, as the true founder of her colonial domain. The lesson that Washington taught Great Britain in the revolutionary war has been applied with eminent success to Canada, to Australia, to South Africa, and to other so-called "dependencies." Great Britain never repeated in respect to these outposts of her empire the blundering policy that drove the American colonies to revolt.
