Trigonia Grows Better

The Trigonia oil well in the Fern Valley district is making good progress in getting out the ten-inch casing, and hopes to have the hole ready to cement and stop the flow of water by next week. They were delayed by the non-arrival of a nipple. Over 1600 feet of heavy 16-inch casing was handled during the last week. There was no work Sunday.

The well is now down 1350 feet, and excellent oil signs and sands have been brought up, so good that those in charge do not feel like imperiling it by the heavy flow of water. The present task is a slow process, and when the way is cleared for drilling, they expect to work every day in the week.—Mail Tribune.

FIRE AT MEDFORD CAUSES HEAVY LOSS; GARAGE BLDG BURNS

MEDFORD, Or., July 25.—The most serious fire in the business district of Medford for many months resulted in the interior of the large brick Tummy Garage company building on South Front street being gutted by flames Friday night, entailing a loss on new and used cars of about \$23,000, and a loss on the building of about \$5000.

The fire was discovered about 9 o'clock and drew a great crowd of people from all sections of the city.

It is thought that the origin of the fire was due to some defect in wiring.

The building is owned by Scott Davis, who roughly estimated his loss at \$5000 with insurance. The building cost \$14,000 to erect, and it was insured from the basement up.

Some difficulty was encountered in getting the fire department by phone and before the department could be reached that way, Wah Kim, well known old Chinaman, staggered up almost breathless in front of the engine house shouting as best he could, "Fliah! Fliah!" Wah Kim had started at once for the fire department to give the alarm as soon

as he saw smoke coming from the building, but his progress was much impeded by people who thought he had gone crazy. But the Chinaman with his "Fliah! Fliah!" continued to plug on by degrees.

METROPOLITAN OPERA SINGER

FIRST WOMAN TO DESCEND INTO CRATER LAKE

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., July 25.—Risking her life on a dare, Madame Lydia Sturtevant, former Metropolitan grand opera singer, and divorced wife of Police Chief August Vollmer, of Berkeley, won the honor of being the first woman to descend into Crater Lake, near Klamath Falls, Or.

During a recent vacation with Dr. and Mrs. E. Sykes, 77 Domingo Road, Berkeley, Madame Sturtevant was dared to descend the 1706 feet to the lake down a perilous incline of ice and snow.

With four guides, the singer, rope about her waist, started the journey, which was accomplished in forty-five minutes.

At the lake she caught a limit of trout in five minutes. Then came the ascent. About midway a giant avalanche of rock came rolling down, and the party narrowly escaped death. One rock struck Madame Sturtevant on the right leg and cut a deep gash, but she reached the top in two and a half hours.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 25.—Governor Len Small has apparently won the fight to force the postponement of his arrest and trial on charges of juggling \$10,000,000 in Illinois state funds, until after his term of office expires. Sheriff Hester of Sangamon county, upon whom the duty of serving the warrant will fall, told the United Press that he would use no force to arrest the indicted governor. State troops will

probably be stationed at Springfield immediately for the protection of Governor Small.
