Domestic Science Department

No matter what the weather conditions, ice cold drinks are always acceptable. However, they are doubly appreciated during the summer months, and the hostess who keeps the materials on hand to prepare these "coolers" is usually very popular. Regardless of the warnings from physicians and dietitians as to the folly of drinking chilled liquids, most of us are tempted at times to indulge in the cooling cup.

Cocoa Eggnog Tempting Drink
A cocoa eggnog is particularly refreshing and nourishing as well, and can be given to both old and young. Beat one egg white very stiff, then add gradually, while constantly beating, two teaspoons of sugar, one teaspoon cocoa and a few grains of salt; take out about one-third of this mixture, and to remaining portion add gradually one cup cold milk, constantly beating. Put the remainder of the mixture on top and serve.
All fruit juices make refreshing drinks and punches. The fruit syrups may be made, and some kinds can be purchased ready for use. The best lemonade is made from prepared syrup in the proportion of two cups each of water and sugar and a thin shaving of lemon peel boiled for about ten minutes, removing any scum which may gather on the surface; cool and add the juice of six to eight lemons. Allow two tablespoons of the lemon syrup for each glass of water.

Partially fill each glass with shaved or crushed ice before pouring in the lemonade. If one does not possess an ice shaver, have a small, stout canvas bag and pound the ice to the consistency of snow. This insures the mixture cooling at once and adds greatly to the attractiveness of the drink. This only applies to cool drinks served in tall glasses, and not those served from a punch bowl.

Chocolate Syrup is made by taking one-third cup of cocoa, two cups of sugar and one cup boiling water. Mix and boil about five minutes. Cool, add one teaspoon vanilla and store in a tightly covered jar or bottle. For iced chocolate use one tablespoon syrup to three-fourths cup of milk; pour over shaved or pounded ice, and put a tablespoon whipped cream on top.

Coffee is Basis for this Syrup
Coffee syrup is useful to have on hand also. Make one pint of strong coffee; strain, add two cups sugar and boil about five minutes. Cool and store in a bottle or tightly covered jar. Use two tablespoons of the coffee syrup to three-quarters cup milk, pour over shaved ice and add one tablespoon cream either whipped or plain; a little nutmeg may be sprinkled over the top. Both the iced chocolate and coffee make excellent warm weather luncheon drinks and offer a change from the usual iced tea. And, by the way, iced tea should be made fresh and used at once if it is to be at its best. Always make tea with water which has been freshly boiled. For iced tea make a little stronger than usual, and steep only four minutes, then pour in tall glasses, two-thirds full of shaved or crushed ice. Add thin slices of lemon and pass powdered sugar. For a tea punch, chill tea, add one-fourth as much lemon juice as tea. Keep very cold and just before serving add one small bottle of ginger ale for every two quarts of tea.

For those persons who enjoy the flavor of chocolate, but do not care to indulge in fattening foods, cocoa may be freely used. Cocoa is almost free of the rich fats contained in chocolate.

Orange Juice
Three oranges, 1 grapefruit, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups boiling water, 1 pint ginger ale, 1 spray fresh mint. Extract orange and grapefruit juice. Boil sugar and water five minutes; cool and add to fruit juice. Just before serving, add ginger ale. Fill bottom of glass with crushed ice, add a small bit of the bruised mint, then fill glasses with liquid. Thin quartered slices of orange or cherries may be added.

Honolulu Fizz
For each service allow: Half cup pineapple juice, half cup sparkling cider, one egg white, tiny spray of mint crushed. Put ingredients into a shaker or jar and shake vigorously for three or four minutes. Pour at once over crushed ice.

Fruit Cup
One quart of cooked sweetened loganberries, 3 lemons (juice only), 1 cup sugar, 1 cup water, ice water. Boil sugar and water five minutes; cool, add fruit and lemon juice and

let stand about two hours. Strain and dilute with ice water to the desired strength.

Lemon Whey
One cup hot milk, 1/2 lemon (juice only), 1 tablespoon sugar. Add lemon juice to milk and cook over a very low fire, or in a double boiler until whey separates. Do not stir. Strain through a cheesecloth, add sugar and chill. Serve with thin slices of lemon. A very refreshing drink.

Fruit Punch
Six lemons (juice only), 6 oranges (juice only), 1 cup grated pineapple, 2 cups strawberry syrup, 1 cup Maraschino cherries, 2 cups freshly made tea, 2 1/2 cups sugar, 1 1/2 cups water, 1 quart apollinaris, 1 gallon ice water. Boil sugar and water five minutes. Cool and add tea, fruit juices, syrup and pineapple. Let stand one hour, then strain. Add ice water and pour over a large piece of ice. Then add apollinaris and cherries. Sufficient for forty.

Southern Punch
Four cups strong tea, 2 oranges (juice only), 2 lemons (juice only), 1 cup sugar, 1 cup boiling water, 1 banana. Boil sugar and water five minutes. Cool and add orange and lemon juice. Allow four level teaspoons tea to four cups of freshly boiled water. Add a small piece of orange rind and let stand five minutes. Strain and cool. Combine mixtures. Pour over crushed ice and add two or three thin slices of banana to each glass.

Orangeade
Two cups sugar, 2 cups orange juice, 1 quart water, 1/2 cup lemon juice. Boil sugar and water five minutes, adding orange rinds. Strain, chill, add fruit juices and dilute to taste with ice water. A mint leaf may be added to each glass. Sufficient for a dozen glasses.

Pineapple Lemonade
One cup grated pineapple, 3 lemons (juice only), 1/2 cup hot water, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1 quart ice water. Boil sugar and hot water about five minutes. Cool, add pineapple and lemon juice. Strain. Add ice water and serve. This makes about fifteen glasses.

Grape Punch
One cup grape juice, 2 lemons (juice only), 2 oranges (juice only), 1 orange cut in thin slices, 2 quarts of water, 1 1/2 cups sugar. Boil the sugar and water for five minutes. Cool, add remaining ingredients and pour over cracked ice. Sufficient for sixteen persons.

College Punch
One cup grated pineapple, 2 quarts boiling water, 2 cups freshly made tea, 6 lemons (juice only), 6 oranges (juice only), 1 quart fruit juice (grape, loganberry or strawberry), 4 cups sugar, 1 quart apollinaris. Cook pineapple, sugar and water together about fifteen minutes. Strain and cool. Add fruit juices and tea. An hour or so before serving pour over cracked ice and add apollinaris. Will serve about forty persons.

California Punch
One quart of cooked apricots (canned or dried), 2 cups sugar, 2 cups water, 1 quart apple juice or apple cider, 2 oranges (juice only), 2 lemons (juice only). Rub the apricots through a coarse sieve. Boil sugar and water together for five minutes, then add apricot pulp. Chill. Let stand at least two hours, then pour over cracked ice. Sufficient for twenty-five punch cups.

BEST WAY TO KILL POULTRY

Sticking the fowl from inside the mouth is now practiced by leading poultrymen and poultry merchants, according to G. F. Bell of the college department of poultry husbandry. Best results are obtained by using a thin sharp bladed knife. The fowl is first hung up by the feet on a suspended cord. The knife is inserted in the mouth and a diagonal slit made across the upper corner of the mouth. This cuts the large artery of the head and allows the fowl to bleed to death quickly. Simultaneously with the cutting of the artery the knife may be turned and the point pierced through the roof of the mouth into the rear brain.
