County Exhibit Is Collected In U. S. Biological Survey

Charles Sperry of the United States biological department, has returned to Seattle, after collecting over 150 specimens of bird and small animal life in Southern Oregon, largely in Jackson county. Every species of frog and lizard that inhabits this section were secured. All but thirty-four specimens of so-called low life in this section were secured. The skeletons were shipped to Seattle for assembling. The stomachs of birds and reptiles were also separated to determine what insects they eat. All the data and information obtained will be contained in a report to be issued soon in a supplementary form. J. H. Hitzler of Brownsboro, of the squirrel exterminating brigade, assisted Prof. Sperry in securing the local collection. Hitzler was also assigned to go to the upper reaches of the Mt. Pitt region and secure two coney rabbits—a rare form of animal life, living in high altitudes, and two bench deer, a species formerly plentiful in Oregon but now nearly extinct. The bench deer has been seen recently near Selma in Josephine county, and in the Evans creek district. The biological survey has been looking for five years for samples of the above creatures. Next spring it is the intention of the department to make a scientific study of the orchard pests abounding in this section, and also what birds are death to them. The much-cursed English sparrow is considered an ideal pest eradicator, except that he will not stay in the country where the pests flourish. Prof. Sperry, as soon as he finishes his present assignment with the government, will join a research expedition launched by the National Geographic society.

LITHIA PARK IS POPULAR; COMING PICNIC OF LODGES

Another big picnic will be held this evening in Lithia Park. Participants will be members of the Eastern Star order and their families, not only from Ashland, but also from Medford, Central Point and Jacksonville, as the chapters from these towns have been invited to join in the Star merger. The picnic supper will be served in the park at 6 o'clock. Families will bring their own dishes, knives, forks and spoons. As to eatables, the worthy matrons of chapters in the respective towns have indicated the supply and variety needed. The Ashland local organization will furnish coffee, sugar and cream on the extra list. The event promises to be the most notable one of its kind held by the order in annual picnic outing assembled.
