**REPORT ASKS STOCK OF BLACK BASS FOR LAKE OF THE WOODS**

ing parties now at the lake, many of whom have built permanent summer quarters. Those caught are of fine quality. Just what is the reason fish do not increase in this lake I was unable to determine. It may be that during dry seasons its waters become too warm for the young fish, which naturally frequent the shallow water, and it is also possible that they may be devoured by the chubs that are quite abundant.

"As this lake is becoming a very popular resort, and is accessible by auto from Klamath county as well as from here, I deem it vital that our best efforts be exerted as soon as possible to provide good fishing.

"To me it seems very problematical as to whether we could ever stock it with trout in sufficient numbers to insure good fishing, and after careful consideration my judgment prompts me to say that the best fish to introduce here is bass. Here is a large lake with no outlet, thus insuring keeping them confined to this particular lake, with exactly the conditions adapted to their requirements, and I therefore respectfully recommend that this species of fish be placed there as soon as stock can be secured.

"In talking with a number of parties who frequent this lake, no disposition was shown to dictate what kind of fish we should place there, and I feel safe in saying that if we decide bass to more suitable than trout it will meet with their hearty approval.

"Acknowledgement is due Hon. E. V. Carter for valuable information and assistance given me while at the lake, as well as Mr. Peck, the forest representative stationed there."

by copious streams of pure blood. The blood cannot be pure and circulate freely as long as the organs of elimination are obstructed by the effects of such mechanical lesions as tight muscles, congested tissues, or badly aligned vertebrae, ribs, or other bony parts.
