"HONEYMOON" IS OVER; HARD WORK AHEAD

WASHINGTON, August 1.—Today finds republican politicians in Washington declaring that "the honeymoon is over."

By this they mean that the Harding administration is settling down to the real tasks that confronted it. The politicians are sorry, for "honeymoon" to them means the time of giving out choice patronage.

Important jobs remain to be distributed, it is true, including many connected with the enforcement of prohibition, which are more sought after than any other kind. But Harding, having taken care of major appointments, has now turned over much of the patronage work to John T. Adams, new chairman of the republican national committee. He was forced to this, his friends say, by the increasing pressure of more important public business.

Politicians are interested in the alleged end of the "honeymoon period," also because to them it marks the time when they may cease to be as careful, tactful and yielding to the heads of their party, as was considered necessary during the time when the disposition of important jobs might hang, in the opinion of at least of some job-seekers, on a smile or a pleasant word or a vote in congress.

In other words, the wise and weary political observers who stay around Washington year after year, are now watching for a little more independence from "the boys," when their views happen to conflict with those of the president or some of his advisors.

The administration is now running full speed ahead, its observing friends report. Its critics, equally observing, admit that it has begun to show signs of life, and they are carefully watching for mistakes. Here are some of the "irons in the fire":

The disarmament conference.

Negotiations and legislation pertaining to refunding of principal and interest of \$10,000,000 in foreign loans.

Settlement of the Pacific question. Preparation of a treaty with Germany, and of a proclamation formally declaring the state of war at an end.

Discussions with the railroads regarding settlement of their account.

Tax and tariff revisions, which are in the hands of congress and are being proceeded with in that body's usual manner.

Reorganization of the shipping board.

JAPANESE GOVERNMENT TO BUILD CITY FOR LEPERS

TOKIO, August 1.—The Japanese government is considering elaborate plans for the control of leprosy, which is at present but little cared for. It is estimated that there are some 16,000 lepers in Japan, of whom only 1500 are being looked after in

private and public asylums, the remainder being allowed to be at large, a constant source of infection.

The government now expects to take serious steps to prevent further spread of the disease by building a model city where the lepers may be gathered together and where proper treatment may be given them. This city is to have all the advantages possessed by the most modern cities in the empire.
