be added to the Washington police force during the conference.

This will be a precautionary step to prevent the revival of American soil of old world feuds, as all the tribes of the earth are expected to send onlookers at the parley, and ancient enemies are bound to meet in the shadow of Washington's monument, strolling down Pennsylvania avenue, or rubbernecking at the White House.

Hook-nosed men from the Hedjas, fezzed Turks, turbaned Hindus, princes, anarchists, statesmen, pickpockets and newspaper reporters are expected to bring class, color and cash—newspapermen excepted on the

last-named possession—to what is confidently predicted will be one of the most spectacular and momentous assemblages in history, rivaling in brilliance the potted Versailles treaty party.
