O. A. C. Expert Reports On Local Chicken Malady

Out of a flock of twelve Tanager hens, six became sick and exhausted, and five of them died with a malady that was not understood by chicken men here. A Bert Freeman sent one of the birds to Oregon Agricultural college for examination and diagnosis. The bird was examined by J. N. Shaw, instructor in veterinary medicine, and he sent the following letter explaining the malady as far as could be determined:

"When I arrived home from a vacation I found your letter and bird awaiting my attention.

"I examined the bird before destroying it, and noted with interest the symptoms, which you have described. The symptoms I could not find; the bird was apparently in good health. I destroyed the bird, and upon post mortem I found about the same condition which you described, some slight inflammation of mucosa of the intestinal tract, and the diseased ovaries. I am at loss to say just what is causing the trouble. It is my opinion that over-production must be considered, but keep in mind that that is an opinion only. There is at present no definite information as to what might cause such ovaries as I found in this bird. We do know, however, that white diarrhea, as it is found in mature birds, affects the ovaries, but causes quite a different appearance than what is present in this bird. You will probably remember hearing me express opinion that poultrymen by their efforts for high production might produce disease. I am still of that opinion, and some day I am certain poultrymen will realize it to be a fact."

Mr. Freeman has made quite a study of poultry, and we give the above explanation and letter for use by others whose flocks may be likewise affected. Mr. Freeman thinks that the trouble may come from feeding for over-production.

found that it would be needed, at cost plus taxes. This year the auto camp ground has been over-crowded, often many cars not finding room for their accommodation and having to drive away. The park board opened negotiations for the Ware-Greer tract, and a deal has just been closed whereby the city acquires it, and the auto camp will be greatly enlarged.

Mr. Ware was a public spirited citizen and an indefatigable worker for the community while a citizen here, and notwithstanding he met with severe criticism while a councilman, has held the property as agreed, and this week turned it over to the city at cost plus taxes without a penny of interest on the six year investment. The property goes to the city at \$1,340. Had it not been for Mr. Ware's foresight and public spirit, it would likely have cost the city some \$3000. The park board have plans for its immediate improvement for additional camping space, and the park superintendent will proceed at once to adapt it to the purpose.

Work on the Pacific highway south of Corvallis is progressing satisfactorily.
