PARCEL POST RATES MAY BE INCREASED IF DEFICIT IS PROVED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 6.—If investigations show that parcel post rates caused the deficit of \$76,000,000 in postal revenue, Postmaster General Hays told the United Press today that parcel post rates must be increased. Hays said the business of the postoffice department had fallen off since April, and that the parcel post should be self-supporting. A rigid system of economy is being instituted.

NO TAXES REPEALED BEFORE JANUARY FIRST SAY HOUSE MEMBERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 6.—Republican members of the house ways and means committee tentatively stated that no taxes would be repealed before January 1, 1922, on account of the needed revenue from excess profits and high surtax levies. This probably means that business firms and wealthy individuals must pay during 1922 the taxes on profits made in 1921.

"DON'T SELL YOUR GOODS TILL YOU GET YOUR PRICE" SENATORS WARN FARMERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 6.—"Don't sell your goods until you get your price," was the warning members of the house and senate sent to farmers throughout the country today as the result of the senate's approval of the administration's farm credits bill, counted to boost prices of all farm products. "Hold your cotton for twenty cents," was the word sent to the cotton states. Western senators told their constituents to ask for higher prices and hold the surplus until the buyers meet the prices asked. Senators predicted today that this move will give a much higher general average to the agricultural market.
