FREEBERGS VISIT SEVEN STATES IN 4,864-MILE TOUR (Continued from Page One)

near Greeley, Colo., we passed a car with an Ashland banner on the windshield and wondered who it was. Denver was our next stop. We were rather up against it to know what road to take for Glenwood Springs about 250 miles west of Denver and the Rocky mountains to cross. The auto club routed us via Lookout Mt. here we saw the burial place of (Buffalo Bill) Col. Wm. Cody. This is the show place and road for the Denverites. Magnificent view and road. At Empire the grade starts over Berthand Pass eleven miles up and steep. Altitude eleven thousand three hundred feet. It took us all day to get up. The roads to Glenwood Springs were good and very bad but some beautiful sights at Glenwood. We spent a week visiting Mrs. Sommers, Mrs. I. Niece. Thirty five miles south of here we saw a town with several hundred buildings, magnificent hotel, club building, a residence the like of which we have never seen in any large city. It was simply amazing. Branch railroad that not a train has passed over for 20 years. A caretaker is all that lives here. The place is called Redstone and was built by several millionaires from New York. The location is beautiful—in a gorge, no habitations near, all fenced and signs "Keep out." Immense coal deposits, hundreds of coke ovens, but the coal could not be mined to any depth on account of the gas. Forty men were burned in the mine after an explosion. The bodies could not be recovered. No one would work there again, so millions of dollars were lost.

It certainly was a beautiful city and well built 20 years ago. Salt Lake, Ogden and Brigham at Snowville. We went to Twin Falls, Ida., Boise to Baker City, west to Sumpter. This town is almost deserted. From here to Prairie City was our very worst road on the whole trip—41 miles. Prineville, Bend, Ft. Klamath, Crater Lake, Ashland, 4,864 miles, ten weeks, but we liked it. MR. AND MRS. W. A. FREEBERG.
