BELIEVE LAND IS ACCURSED

French Workmen Refuse to Complete Building of Structure Which They Assert is Haunted.

Corner sites are usually at a premium in any great city, but Paris has one that has remained unoccupied for nearly 30 years simply because French carpenters, bricklayers and masons refuse to complete a structure which was begun there and which they declare is haunted. The corner is the rue de la Villette.

In 1892 the owner of the plot decided to build a three-story brick apartment house, but hardly had work started on the walls when workmen found the body of a woman who had been cut into pieces and buried in a basket. The laborers threw down their tools and refused to work. A new crew was hired, but the first day they were at work a scaffold fell, killing one of the workmen and injuring another. This convinced the superstitious ones in the force that the place was haunted and they induced the contractor to give up the job.

For 22 years the construction work was halted and then another contractor tried the task, but the following day the war began, and the contract was recalled. Since then the owners of the property have refused to go near the site, although they are willing to sell it if a buyer can be found who will assume all the risks.

BOILER IN EARTH'S INTERIOR

Constant Inflow of Sea is Said to Be Responsible for Destructive Earthquakes. One of the world's wonders of which few people have ever heard is at Argostoli, in the island of Cephalonia, the largest of the seven Ionian islands. The power that works the cornmills at Argostoli is derived from the sea, which rushes downward into the land. Many millions of gallons of salt water have run down into the interior of the earth in this manner.

Experts believe that the water finds its way down through the soil and rocks to heated areas far beneath the surface, where it becomes steam.

But where are the necessary outlets for such vast clouds of steam? The opinion is held by some that the answer to this mystery is to be found in the frequent activity of the nearest volcano.

It is supposed that the active volcanoes of Italy are the safety valves of the enormous subterranean boiler which is turning this inflowing water into the steam and gases which escape from these volcanoes.

Some scientists declare that if the inflow of the sea was stopped earthquakes would be less frequent.

Shunting Without Locomotive. Railroad yards are now being equipped with a system which dispenses with the necessity of making use of a locomotive and its crew merely for the purpose of shifting a car or two. An electric capstan was recently introduced for just such a purpose. The car puller, as the device is called, consists of a powerful electric motor driving a capstan through a lever reduction coil. In order to pull one or two cars along the track, one end of a stout rope is made fast to a car while the other end is wrapped around the capstan and pulled by the operator so as to insure a firm hold. A handle protruding through the motor casing serves to start and stop the motor.

Telephone Statistics. From the bureau of census, Washington, D. C., the report on telephones which forms part of the census of electrical industries for 1917 can now be had. According to this report there were in that year 11,716,820 telephones in the United States, exclusive of certain railway, government and private lines. The estimated number of messages or talks was nearly 22,000,000,000, the miles of wire reached 28,827,188, the employees numbered 262,629, and the value of the plant and equipment was almost \$1,500,000,000. Seventy per cent approximately of the telephone business was done by the Bell system.

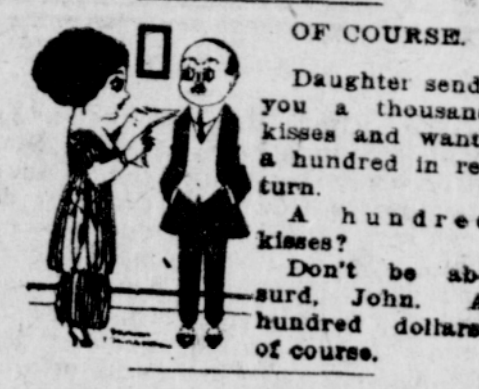
French Minister for Sports. France has created a minister for sport. The portfolio has been given to S. Vidal, a distinguished soldier and president of the Sports' Union of France.

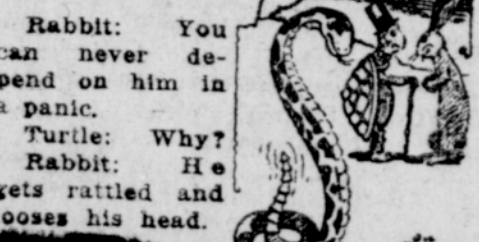
