Oregon School Apportionment Below Normal

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 16.—The total of \$384,985.60 in interest collected on school fund loans by state land board and distributed by the state treasurer to the several counties of the state represents a total school population of 221,288 in the state on a basis of \$1.74 per capita. This is the lowest per capita apportionment in four years, attributed to lesser collections due to pinched financial circumstances of the farmer borrowers, but it is believed this will be made up within a year and that foreclosures will not be necessary. In 1920 the per capita distribution of the interest was \$2.02, in 1919 it was \$1.95 and in 1918 it was \$1.83.

Multnomah county leads with 65,571 children and \$110,597.06 money received. Clackamas county ranks second, Jackson county ranks tenth with 6,545 children and \$11,228.33 received.

JUSTICE OF OREGON SUPREME COURT TO FILL PHILIPPINE VACANCY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—Justice Charles W. Johns of the Oregon supreme court has been formally selected to fill the vacancy in the Philippine supreme court caused by the resignation of Edam C. Carson.

AUGUST 17 SET FOR RECOGNITION '25 EXPOSITION

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 16.—(Special.)—Governor Olcott has issued the following proclamation setting aside August 17 for state-wide recognition of the resolution recently signed by President Harding giving Oregon national recognition for the holding of a world's exposition at Portland in 1925:

"MESSAGE TO THE PEOPLE OF OREGON"

"The signing of the joint resolution by President Harding that was recently passed by congress giving the state of Oregon national recognition to hold a world's exposition in 1925 should be the signal for a state-wide demonstration in recognition of the opportunity afforded to present the resources, scenic advantages and the civilization west of the Rockies to all the world.
 "Oregon has occasion to rejoice to its fullest for the opportunity to stage the first great peace-loving and industrial exposition since the close of the war, wherein the nations of the world will be our guests.
 "Therefore, as governor of the state of Oregon, I ask the people to lay their cares aside for the hour and join in their acknowledgements to this wonderful opportunity by participating with the great metropolis of the state in their various communities in holding a celebration in keeping with the significance of the occasion.
 "Wednesday evening, August 17, 1921, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock is the time set by the exposition directorate for the state to proclaim in unison that the spirit of progress may continue to follow 'Westward' where the course of empire takes its way."

"Signed, BEN W. OLCOTT, Governor."

SEC. FALL AND ESPEE PRESIDENT ARRIVE IN WEEK

The national parks inspection party, consisting of A. B. Fall, secretary of the interior; Stephen Mather, director of national parks, and E. O. McCormick, vice-president of the Southern Pacific, who it was thought might reach Ashland last Saturday, has been gotten track of at last, though it is not known where they are at present.

Sheldon, president of the chamber of commerce, the party will arrive in Klamath Falls on August 19, will spend the night of that date at Pelican Bay and will arrive at Crater Lake on the morning of August 20. They will remain at the lake until the 21st or 22d, when they will depart for Medford. The party will be at Lake Tahoe on September 17.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—Senators McNary and Stanfield hope to reach an agreement and make a definite announcement as to federal patronage in Oregon within the week.

It can be stated on absolute authority now that Clyde G. Huntley of Oregon City will be made collector of internal revenue. Major Clarence R. Hotchkiss, United States marshal, and Asa B. Thomson of Echo, brother-in-law of Senator Stanfield, will be given an important place with the farm loan bank with headquarters at Spokane.

ASHLAND LEADS STATE POINTS IN HIGHWAY TRAFFIC

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 16.—The Pacific highway carries the heaviest traffic of all Oregon roads, according to a report issued by the state highway department today relative to a traffic census taken July 15, 16 and 17, with the count of vehicles being made continuously each of the three days from 6 o'clock a. m. to 10 p. m. The Columbia river highway stands second.

The count covers all kinds of vehicles, listed as horse-drawn, motorcycles, passenger cars of Oregon, passenger cars of other states, light duty trucks, trucks of 1 1/2 tons and over.

At the New Era bridge on the Pacific highway the count showed a total of 1,932 vehicles during the three days and at a point 1,000 feet south of Aurora 1,347 vehicles passed.

The census takers then jumped south to a point 500 feet south of

Albany, where only 828 vehicles passed. Traffic was considerably under the 1,000 mark until eight miles north of Ashland was reached, where the count was 1,688.

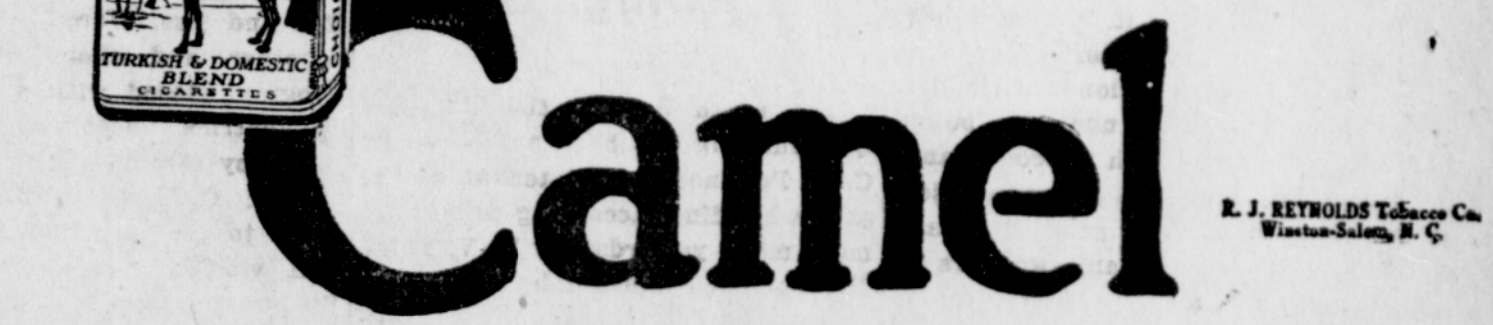
