This is the lowest per capita apportionment in four years, attributed to lesser collections due to pinched financial circumstances of the farmer borrowers, but it is be lieved this will be made up within a year and that foreclosures will not be necessary. In 1920 the per capita distribution of the interest was \$2.02, in 1919 it was \$1.95 and in 1918 it was \$1.83.

Multnomah county leads with 65, 571 children and \$110,597.06 money received. Clackamas county ranks second, Jackson county ranks tenth with 6.545 children and \$11,228,33 received.






